

# HOCKEY EYES ARE CENTERED ON MAROONS-BRUINS GAME TONIGHT

## CANADIENS ENTERTAIN N. Y. AMERICAN OUTFIT

### City Basketball Season To Commence On Wednesday, Dec. 1

"Newsy" Lalonde, Former French-Canadian Idol, Leads Gotham Outfit Against His Old Teammates

MONTREAL, Nov. 23.—All hockey eyes are centred on the meeting tonight of the Montreal Maroons and Boston hockey teams of the National Hockey League, in the air of the Bruins. On the basis of their super-effort at the close of last season, the addition of half a dozen western stars, and the fact that they have a slight edge on the world champions over the season's route last year, the Bostonians have been regarded as the strong threat to the other teams of the league this year. They started the season with two wins, but suffered a decisive 5 to 1 loss at Chicago on Saturday. Tonight's game is looked to give some indication of the relative strength of the Bostonians and the champions.

Canadiens have a chance in the next ten days to hit a victory stride. They will be hosts to the New York Americans tonight, meet the Rangers here on Saturday, and St. Pats also at the Forum on the following Thursday. Three home games with lots of rest in between. On the basis of the showing Saturday when they had the lion's share of the play if not of the score against Maroons, the Canadiens are expected to bolster their standing which is just zero in official figures at present.

**SUMMARY MADE.**  
On the basis of play so far, E. W. Ferguson, of the Herald, sums up the situation as follows:  
"1.—Montreal Maroons have a powerful team with enough reserve strength probably a shade better than the rugged machine of last year.  
"2.—Ottawa Senators, the runners-up in point of reserves, but still have scarcely enough material to back up the 'Big Six'.  
"3.—Montreal Canadiens are a vastly improved club, and will be formidable when their new material is welded together.  
"4.—New York Rangers and Chicago Blackhawks are far the best of the new clubs, and constitute a real menace to the other title-seeking clubs.  
"5.—From an ethical point of view, the Bruins, a powerful club on paper, disappointed in defeat Saturday night. St. Pats do not look at all promising, and their defence is reported wobbly. Detroit can't be analyzed on what they have shown."  
The fact that Newsy Lalonde, the "Old Fox" of sports, long an idol with French-Canadian athletic followers, is leading the Americans against his former club, the Canadiens, tonight, adds a piquant touch to that encounter.

## TWO SECTIONS EXPECTED FOR INTERMEDIATES

Hon. Dr. Baxter Donates Cup—Referees For Season Appointed

THE senior basketball season will open here on Wednesday, Dec. 1, it was decided at a meeting of the City Basketball League held last evening in the Y. M. C. A., with the president, John J. Dunlop, in the chair. On the same evening the Intermediate League also will open. There will be one senior game and two intermediate, furnishing a good bill for the opening night. League games will be played each Wednesday evening and also possibly on Saturdays, if the floor can be secured.  
A letter was received from J. C. Chesley stating that he would be glad to step the office of honorary president, to which he was elected at the initial meeting. During the course of the evening it was made known that Hon. J. B. Baxter had signified his intention of offering a trophy for the Intermediate Basketball League. The offer was received and accepted by the meeting.  
It was decided that the fee for entry to the Senior City Basketball League would be fixed at \$6 for each team and \$4 for intermediate teams. To date three teams have entered the senior league and eight teams the intermediate league. Another meeting will be held on Friday night when the matter of a schedule for the different leagues will be dealt with. Some discussion took place last evening whether the league should be run on the same basis as the National Hockey League, viz., two sections with interleague games, or two sections with no interleague games, the matter was left over until Friday night for settlement.

Referees for the season were appointed for the two leagues, Ronald Shephard for the senior league and J. B. Baxter for the intermediate.
