GO SLOW WITH IODIZED SALT
IODIZED salt, which has been recommended as a preventive of goiter in children, and which is being used extensively, may do serious injury when used by persons having goiter already developed.

This is the opinion of Dr. O. P. Kimball, Cleveland, O., one of the recognized authorities on the prevention of goiter.

Experience in Cleveland, according to Dr. Kimball, indicates that while a small amount of iodine is effective in the prevention of goiter, if it is used by persons already afflicted, a comparatively simple condition may be converted into a serious one.

It also has been found that a number of adults, especially susceptible to the effects of iodine, have developed a temporary "iodine rash" after using iodized salt.

In Michigan the state department of health has begun an investigation to determine the results of the use of the salt.

"Busted up," said Henry. "It swelled so already it won't stay in the dish."


"For shame, Henry," cried his wife. "Busted! Indeed! You should say 'busted'."

"Then what is right?" asked Mrs. Sea-Cow nervously.


