Idaho Lumberman to Offer \$500,000 For Labor Day.
Shelby, Mont., June 26.—John Sexsmith, prominent Idaho lumberman, has arrived in Shelby to try to arrange a bout between the winner of the Dempsey-Gibbons contest and either Harry Wills or the winner of the Willard-Firpo bout. Sexsmith announced that he is ready to offer \$500,000 for the fight, which is to be held in Coeur d'Alene on Labor Day. He said there is an arena there capable of seating 10,000 persons and the capacity can be increased to 100,000. Sexsmith is the man who financed the Mike Gibbons-Al Summers bout in Coeur d'Alene on July 2, 1921, the same day that Dempsey fought Carpenter in Jersey City.

the face that Dempsey sent Jess Willard to the floor in the first round of their championship engagement at Toledo, July 4, 1919. Willard went to the floor seven times in that round. It was a terrific left hook to the stomach that finished Fred Fulton, a Rochester, Minn., plasterer, at Harrison, N. J., in the first round, and it was a left hook to the body that started George Carpentier to the floor in the great 1921 spectacle at Jersey City.

A left to face or body is Dempsey's most frequent blow, yet his right to jaw and ribs is unusually effective. He shoots straight to the mark. His blows, well-timed, travel only a short distance, the tremendous power of the shoulders being employed in every launching.

Tomlin Sets Mark For Trapshooting
His Unbroken String of 248 at 22 Yards Surpasses All Previous Records.

Fred S. Tomlin, Glassboro, N. J., member of the Winchester shooting team, established a new world's record for clay target shooting from twenty-two yards at the tournament of the Meadow Springs Gun Club of Philadelphia recently when he broke 248 straight. The best known previous record is 108 straight by Mark Arle, an

amateur, made in the Grand American Handicap in Chicago, Aug. 23 and 24, 1917. No professional record is listed. The first 100 targets were registered by the Amateur Trapshooting Association of America. Tomlin missed his first target and then broke ninety-nine straight. Twenty-five target sweepstakes were conducted after the shooting in these with a regular squad and broke 149, missing the last target he shot at. This run of 248 probably is one of the most remarkable pieces of handiwork shooting ever accomplished.

This has been a year of excellent performance. In the Rhode Island state shoot, Arnold Sisson, a boy of 16, tied his father, A. T. Sisson, for the State championships, breaking 193 off of 200. In the second shoot-off the younger defeated his father by breaking twenty straight to his father's eighteen. In the first shoot-off each broke nineteen out of twenty.

YESTERDAY IN THE BIG LEAGUES
New York, June 26.—The National League worm turned yesterday but it made little progress. It meant that Philadelphia, the lowliest centipede in the major leagues, came within an ace of defeating New York, which ran its string of victories to seven, 11 to 0, and that Boston, after dropping a series to the Giants, smote Brooklyn 7 to 4. Jess Barnes finally won a game for his new team mates.

Cincinnati came back at Chicago, 6 to 5, in a battle of home runs, four being made, but made no progress, as Pittsburgh again beat St. Louis 3 to 1. Fred Toney was in uniform, apparently pacified after his tilt with his team mate, Toporcer.

Ruth rejoined his team mates, clearing up his mysterious absence from Sunday's exhibition game at New Haven, with the school boys' excuse that he overslept, and the Yankees beat Boston 14 to 6. They needed to as Philadelphia came to life after Connie Mack shook up the infield and defeated Washington 3 to 0.

Both Chicago and St. Louis advanced, the White Sox stepping on the tale of the Tigers, downing Detroit 7 to 1, while the Browns chased the Indians off the warpath 9 to 4.

St. Louis stopped Guy Morton's string of 21 consecutive hitless innings by knocking him from the box.
