NEW WONDERS IN THE ZOO.

Origin of the Collections of Heads and Horns Now on View.

For the last 30,000 or more years the human race, beginning in its infancy, has been endeavoring to destroy the animal life of the world, says Dr. William T. Hornaday, director of the New York Zoological Garden, and if the managers of the Zoological Society had not in 1906 begun to take note of the fact and started to bring together the heads and horns of the mammalian fauna there would be no record of them left in the world.

Dr. Hornaday was speaking apropos of the Museum of Heads and Horns in the Zoological Garden, the up-to-date new building dedicated the last of May. It was in 1906 Madison Grant, vice-pres- ident of the Zoological Society, sent out a call for a national collection to pre- serve a representation of the big game animals of the world, there was such a remarkable response from sportsmen and men of wealth that the collection now housed in the new museum building is intact. The great record collection of animals has been marked with blue and red stars that the casual visitors may pick them out at first view. First in order of remarkable gifts to the collection and one of its greatest treasures of the museum is a pair of African elephant tusks which hold the record of the world for size and quality. The Zoo people describe them as being "enormous and unsurpassable." They were a gift from the late Charles T. Barney.

Three big collections were presented intact. The great record collection of African heads for which money was being chased outright by Emerson McMullin, who contributed the entire \$5,000 himself. George J. Gould purchased the Donaldson Smith Sudan African col-

sportsmen of big game of international reputation, Roosevelt and others, have filled the new museum building with what Dr. Hornaday calls "great numbers of grand prizes." Every head in the building has been mounted by one of the world's most skillful taxidermists, he says, and they will last for centuries, their value increasing with the lapse of time. It was not until the beginning of the nineteenth century that real trophies began to be made on the big animal life of the country, according to Dr. Hornaday.

"When primitive man first made rudimentary weapons for himself and emerged from his caves and caverns to assume possession of the earth, he found a still magnificent mammalian fauna," says the director of the Zoo. "He elected himself overlord and king of the wild beasts, and went forth slaying and to slay. But for 30,000 years or more his power for mischief was limited by the crudeness of his offensive weapons. Even down to the year 1900, predatory man had made no alarming impression upon the wild animals of the world, either on land or sea.

"With the dawn of the nineteenth century there began a period of slaughter of the world's finest animals. The greedy and merciless character of it knew few limitations. In 1870 the rise of the breech-loading rifle more than quadrupled the annual volume of slaughter. By the year 1900 great masses of the finest animal species of Africa, North America and Australia had been swept away. It then became evident that those whose moral duty it was to create zoological museums must be up and doing while animal specimens remained with which to fill them. The roofed, horned and tusked animals had suffered most severely, and many species were nearing either practical or total extinction."

It was then that the Zoological Society began to take alarm, and in 1906 sent out a call for all in preserving the relics of the life which remained which resulted in its wonderful collection which has now been adequately housed in the new museum building in the Zoological Garden which has in itself new and original features never before used.
