

## CLOSING SESSION SUPREME COUNCIL TEMPLE OF HONOR

The seventy-fourth annual convention of the Supreme Council of the Temple of Honor and Temperance concluded its sessions in the Temple Hall, Main street yesterday, and the many visiting delegates will return to their homes across the border today. On the final day, a morning business session at which the new ritual was adopted was followed in the afternoon by an automobile tour of inspection of harbor facilities and the beauty spots of the vicinity of the city, in which the delegates were the guests of His Worship, Mayor Schofield.

The impressive installation of officers took place at a public gathering in the evening, when the reports of the committees on obituaries and resolutions were heard and at which Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, on behalf of the Supreme Council, presented to the retiring Supreme Templar, Hon. David I. Robinson, a gold headed ebony cane. Copies of the new ritual were presented to each Templar as the personal gift of the retiring Supreme Templar.

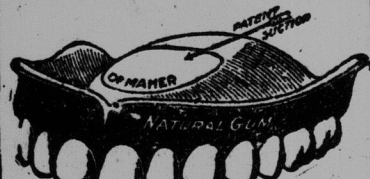
Votes of thanks were extended to the St. John Templars and the Ladies' Auxiliary for entertainment provided and to the press for the very full reports of the sessions.

## UNCOVER STILL NEAR NEWCASTLE

Newcastle, Aug. 27.—Inspectors James Adam, Dickson and H. Saunders left Newcastle yesterday morning in search of a still, which was reported to be in operation a short distance from town. After a search of several hours the inspectors found a spot which showed signs of recent industry. Several barrels with a quantity of mash in them, part of a stove and several other articles were located. A quantity of mash was brought to town for examination. Further developments are expected in the near future.

## IMPORTANT ACTION BY GOVERNMENT AS TO ALCOHOL

Ottawa, Aug. 27.—Under the amendments to section 261 and part X of the inland revenue act as passed at the last session of parliament, the manufacture and supply of methylated spirits (or denatured alcohol as it will be known in future) was placed in the hands of licensed distillers in lieu of the department of customs and inland revenue. Tentative regulations for putting this new system into effect have been sent to all distillers who are licensed, as well as a copy of the approved specifications covering the quality of wood alcohol which must be used as a denaturant. There are nine licensed distilling firms in the dominion, as follows: The Canadian Industrial Alcohol Co. Ltd., Belleville (Ont.), the British Columbia Distillery Co. Ltd., New Westminster (B. C.), Hiram Walker & Sons, Ltd., Walkerville (Ont.), Joseph E. Seagram, Toronto; Gooderham & Worts, Ltd., Toronto; J. I. Wiser & Sons, Ltd., Prescott (Ont.); Montreal Products Co. Ltd., Montreal; St. Hyacinthe Distillery Co. Ltd., St. Hyacinthe (Que.), and the Melchers Gin and Spirits Distillery Co. Ltd., Berthierville (Que.).

As there has been a shortage in the quantity of denatured alcohol available for the industrial requirements of the dominion of late, this change in the federal policy towards the manufacture of this much needed material in industry is of great importance to Canadians. The firms above mentioned may make shipment only to holders of permits to have in possession and use grade No. 1 consisting of 80 per cent ethyl alcohol and 20 per cent methyl alcohol or grade No. 2, consisting of 90 per cent ethyl alcohol, 9 per cent methyl alcohol and 1 per cent commercial benzene. Hospitals and universities holding permits to have grade No. 1 in possession and use may receive denatured alcohol composed of 80 per cent ethyl alcohol and 20 per cent methyl alcohol, grade No. 2, consisting of 70 per cent ethyl alcohol and 30 per cent methyl alcohol, may be shipped to any one without restriction.

London, Aug. 27.—George Driscoll, general manager of Trans-Canada Theatres, Limited, which controls theatres in many of the big cities of the dominion, announces that such noted stars as Martin Harvey, H. V. Rand and Eva Moore will tour Canada next season.
