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U. S. AND THE LEAGUE

While Senators Borah and Johnson have proclaimed the death of the League of Nations as a result of the Republican victory, there are many other Republicans who hold the opposite view, which is also held by some of the leading Republican newspapers. There is also the fact that President-elect Harding is to confer with some of the leading minds of the party on his return from his holiday, with special reference to an association of nations. That Mr. Harding has been elected president does not remove the fact that the United States must do business with other countries, and cannot adopt a policy of isolation without great injury to herself.

DOING A GOOD WORK

ATTACKING QUEBEC

Two more discouraged generals it would be difficult to find anywhere than General Wolfe, the English commander, and General Montcalm, the French leader. The city was in a fearful condition; the lower town was in ruins, among the first of the big buildings to be shattered being the Church of Notre Dame des Victoires, erected to commemorate the defeat of the English Admiral Philips.

She is Daughter of W. K. Vanderbilt of New York—Only Two Witnesses Heard—Duke Denied Charges.

London, Nov. 9.—The Duchess of Marlborough, formerly Consuelo Vanderbilt, daughter of W. K. Vanderbilt, was today awarded a decree of divorce from the Duke of Marlborough. All allegations of desertion and misconduct were made by the duchess, but she did not appear in court. Formal denial of the charges was made by the duke's counsel, but no evidence was taken. The duchess was also awarded the costs of the action.
