REPORTS ON "FLU"

Montreal, Jan. 29.—(By Canadian Press)—During the period Jan. 20-27, there were forty-six cases of influenza reported to the Montreal health department, seven deaths from the same disease and thirty deaths from pneumonia and broncho-pneumonia, according to figures given out yesterday by Dr. S. Boucher, medical health officer.

Cobalt Fears Epidemic.

Cobalt, Ont., Jan. 29.—About eighteen cases of flu have been reported in Cobalt and there are fears that it may become epidemic here.

Bishop Critical of Group Government

Kingston, Ont., Jan. 29.—The group system of government was deprecated by Bishop Lawler in his annual charge to the Anglican Synod of Ontario here yesterday. He said there was a dangerous tendency in political life towards the formation of groups representing certain classes of the community, which how ever lofty their profession of governing in the interests of all alike, were apt to modify these professions in the direction of vital statistics and medical inspection of schools, and the establishment of a health department with a minister in charge, has attracted attention all over Canada and the United States.

CHILDREN DEAD

Little John Lesly McBeath, aged two and a half years, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wesley Duncan McBeath of 73 City road, died yesterday afternoon of diphtheria in the Epidemic Hospital after a short illness. On January 28, a telegram from her brother, notifying her of her niece's illness. She took her little son to her home and became ill there. She arrived home on Tuesday night and it was found that the little lad had diphtheria. Death came yesterday afternoon at the household of the last of a happy family of children. Mrs. McBeath will be felt for the bereaved parents.

LIKE OLD TIMES WITH THE BOSTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

Boston, Jan. 29.—Horse-drawn pungs have been used by the fire department here this week for the first time in more than twenty years. The heavy snow fall led to a search of the department stores and at least a score of old pungs were found. These with others hired and equipped with fire fighting apparatus were placed in the suburban stations, where they have proved their usefulness in hilly districts.

ANOTHER CASE ON THE MINNEKHADA.
