

DROWNED IN THE MARSH CREEK

Harry Smith, Aged Nineteen Year, Meets Untimely Death—Pulmotor Used But Without Success

Harry Smith, nineteen years of age, an expressman who delivers parcels for purchasers in the city market, was drowned in the Marsh creek about 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. After bathing with his two cousins, Smith was sitting on the bank washing the mud from his feet when he slipped in. The two youngsters started for help and brought Policeman Ralph Dykeman and a crowd of people to the scene. The body was recovered by Mark Breen and the pulmotor sent for and although nearly two tanks of oxygen were used, resuscitation was impossible. Dr. F. L. Kenny, the coroner has decided that no inquest is necessary. Mr. Smith is survived by his mother, Mrs. L. Campbell, of Hoyt Station, and an uncle, George Anderson, 218 Brussels street. He resided with Mrs. Sabina, 60 Erin street.

INTOXICATION ON THE STAGE

Actors Who Have Impersonated Drunkards—Will They Be Seen No More?

A writer in the New York Sun recalls the various actors who have impersonated drunkards, and prognosticates that as the function of the drama is to hold the mirror up to nature, such representations will no doubt disappear from the contemporary stage with prohibition. It seems a rather rash conclusion. Drinking and drunkenness do not necessarily and automatically vanish from life with the coming into effect of national prohibition. There must remain considerable stores of the condemned fluid to be disposed of in the aid years to come, and there may be such things as boot-leggers and illicit stills. Then since the leading plays on the American stage are only rarely and at odd intervals provided by American playwrights, and since Grundy, Barrie, Pinero, Galsworthy and Shaw will continue, probably to live in ram-steept Britain, they will have the opportunity of studying the liquor question and setting it forth on the American stage if they desire to do so.

Perfect Art. There is no doubt that the stage has been well high perfect in its accuracy of depicting various degrees of intoxication. The public taste and criticism of such a condition was of a very high order. For example, the majority of the audience might have different ideas of how a man would act after he had murdered his wife or had the news of a great fortune, but the dullest intelligence would make no error as to how an intoxicated man should behave himself. As a bit of act, that made a great hit with the American public the case is cited of an incident in one of Cohan's early plays, "Little Johnny Jones" where a character staggered on and off the stage uttering not a word. Mr. Cohan did not need to invent the incident. One remembers seeing it done very effectively indeed thirty years or so ago in the "Old Homestead" where an intoxicated trailer followed the Salvation Army across the stage. It is interesting to note that one of the first hits Maude Adams made was in 1892, when she played in "The Masked Ball" with John Drew and gave most realistic imitation of a lady who had looked too long on the wine when it was red.

Some Memorable Scenes. In the "Rejuvenation of Aunt Mary," May Robson made a hit as an elderly lady who became inebriated, and in both "The Resurrection" and the "Woman in the Case" Blanche Walsh had thrilling scenes of intoxication. It will be recalled that drunkenness figures in several of Mrs. Fiske's plays. In "Tess" she had the drunken father, and in "Becky Sharp" Rowdon Crawley was a hard drinker. In "Salvation Nell" too, there was a fine bar room flavor to everything that did not smack of Sing Sing. No finer exhibition of a state of rather gentlemanly intoxication was ever given,

probably, than that of G. P. Huntley when he was several years ago with "Three Little Maids"; but of course anything that Huntley did was done with a perfection that is hard to equal. The same thing may be said of Sir Harry Lauder's masterpieces, "Fu the Noo," and if there should never be another representation of intoxication upon the stage, future generations who hear Lauder on the phonograph need never have any doubt as to how an intoxicated Scotchman talks and sings.

Scenes in Recent Successes. Two of last season's successes on the New York stage, "Redemption" and "The Jess," contained scenes of intoxication. One was played by John Barrymore, and is said to have been extremely vivid, while the performance of his brother Lionel was equally rich in alcoholic content. William Faversham has scored several times in representations of drunkenness. In "Lord and Lady Algy" he used to make a great hit in a tippy scene. In "Dear Brutus," which is said to be one of the finest things Barrie ever wrote, the opening act shows the star, William Gillette, in a state of high intoxication, but it is hardly to be expected that Barrie would represent a mauling man for no better reason than to get a laugh from the audience. On the other hand, such successful entertainers as May Irwin used deliberately to introduce tippy scenes, which delighted her audiences for many years, the climax being when she collapsed on the floor. It is to be doubted if she could "get by" with similar stuff nowadays, for public taste in such matters is changing.

Some Real Experts. Among musical comedy favorites who shone particularly as "sozzies," we recall Frank Daniels, De Wolf Hopper, Thomsen, Charles Bigelow, with Anna Held for several seasons, was a highly gifted artist in this respect, and the same may be said of Harry Connor, who will be remembered in "A Trip to Chinatown." Leon Errol is said to have made a big hit with his tupples tricks in both New York and London, his methods being somewhat reminiscent of those successfully employed by Bigelow. One might give an even longer list of playwrights who have touched upon the drink question either in a tragic or a comic spirit, beginning with Shakespeare and coming down to Barrie, and of course a whole column might easily be devoted to a discussion of "Ten Nights in a Barroom," one of the most successful pieces of dramatic literature in the history of the American stage.
