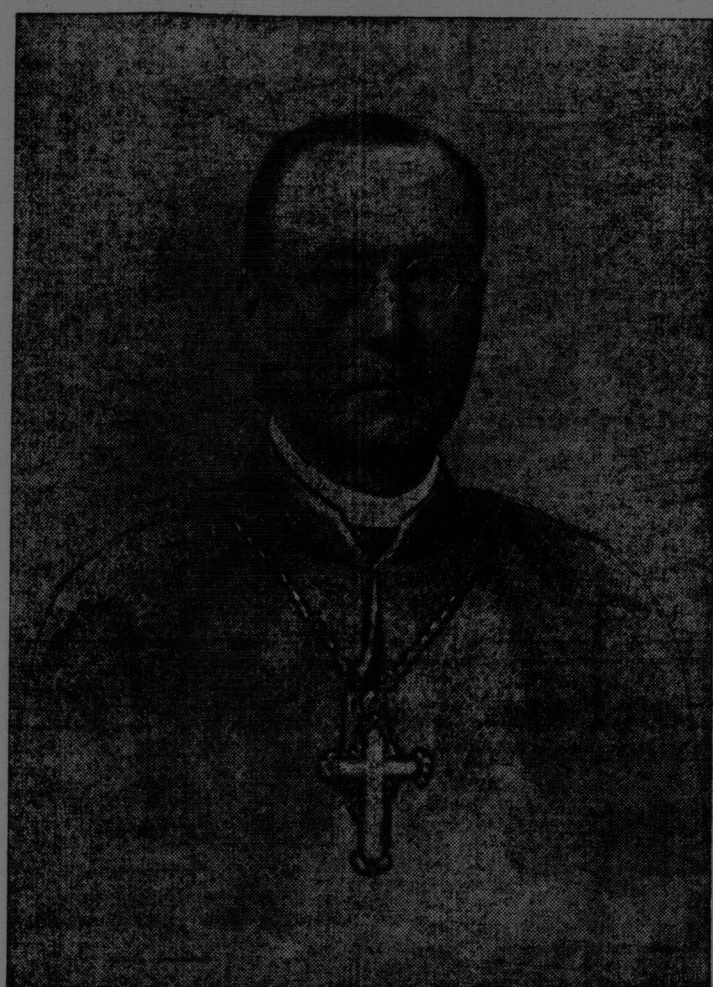

## Great Throng Present as Bishop Louis O'Leary of Chatham Is Consecrated

## HIS LORDSHIP BISHOP BAR RY OF CHATHAM

A cross in white is placed at the head of the bishop's seat on the throne and two large white pinnacles are placed between the bishop's, the canon's and the deacon's seats, while smaller pinnacles are placed at the heads of the deacons seats.

Three large arches were built, one at the foot of the drive leading up to the bishop's palace, and one in front of the main entrance of St. Thomas' College, and one in front of St. Michael's Academy, the first having three gateways and the other one. These arches have been trimmed with boughs and decorated with the papal colors in harmony with the other decorations in honor of the event.

This evening the front of the cathedral will be lighted by more than one hundred electric lamps placed in advance of the bishop's palace and the arch in front of the bishop's palace also will be brightly illuminated.

In the Opera House on Tuesday evening an address and a handsome gold pectoral cross and chain were presented to Bishop O'Leary by James F. Connors, on behalf of the local Knights of Columbus, C. M. B. A., and A. O. H. Bishop O'Leary replied, speaking in very feeling terms of the presentation and gift. After he had concluded his remarks Rev. A. W. Meahan, D. D., of St. Andrew's, and Rev. William Rosch addressed those present.

Several St. John people are in Chatham for the consecration, amongst them, Mr. and Mrs. John McDonald, Jr., Mrs. George V. McInerney, E. Blake McInerney.

**EMPRESS SURVIVORS HOME**  
Liverpool, June 11.—Pitiful scenes were enacted here today when the steamer Alaskan, having aboard 128 members of the crew and forty-seven passengers, survivors of the Empress of Ireland disaster, arrived. Pathetic scenes followed reunions between members of families of survivors and during the crush of women to clasp their loved ones many fainted. The bodies of nine dead were also on the Alaskan.

**THE MANUFACTURERS**  
Montreal, June 11.—The Canadian Manufacturers' Association was given a "straight talk" by Charles A. Dunning, of the Saskatchewan Co-operative Company at yesterday afternoon's session of the association. Mr. Dunning said he came as a representative of the Saskatchewan farmers, to present their views to the eastern manufacturers. With reference to the tariff he warned that the western farmers were strongly in favor of free trade, and that if the manufacturers were not reasonable in their tariff demands there might be trouble between western and eastern Canada.

The delegates expressed their appreciation of Mr. Dunning's outspoken words by a standing vote. Incidentally, in the course of his address Mr. Dunning deprecated the loading up of the western farmers by the manufacturers with machinery and mortgages.

A demand for extension of technical education in schools was made in the report of the education committee of the association this morning. It is said by the committee that unless this sort of school is extended, Canada will fall behind in the industrial race.

The association elected president, C. Henderson, first vice, J. H. Sherrard; second vice, Lieut-Col. W. M. Gartshore; treasurer, Geo. Booth; auditor, Wilton F. Edie, Toronto.

**TO RECEIVE DEGREE**  
Dr. W. P. Bonnell will leave this evening for Boston to attend the commencement exercises of Tufts medical and dental college when his son, Percival L. Bonnell will receive his degree of D. M. D. Percy Bonnell is only twenty-one years of age, having just recently passed the eligible age for graduation and has successfully passed his final examinations, standing well in a class of about 100 students, of which he was the youngest. He has had a brilliant career as a student. He graduated from the twelfth grade in the St. John High School when only eighteen and during the three years he has been at Tufts University, he has won the admiration of his professors and was also popular with his fellow students. During his last year he has received several appointments, among them being that of visiting dentist to Deer Island Hospital. Mrs. Bonnell is at present visiting her son in Boston, and she and Doctor Bonnell will both be present at the graduation exercises on June 17. Dr. P. L. Bonnell will be associated with his father in his office at 9 Germain street.
