(The Westminster Gazette.) Water sterilization by heat in South Africa was impossible by reason of the lack of fuel on the high veldt. In France an army surgeon at the front tells the Hospital, there is abundance of fuel everywhere, and those commanding officers who take a lively interest in hygiene are prohibiting the consumption of water which has been boiled—e. g., by being made into tea. In the trenches this excellent rule may be a counsel of perfection difficult to carry out in its strictest letter. But the fact remains that hitherto the army has been extraordinarily free from water-borne diseases.

The Secretary of State for War, on the other hand, is believed to favor the plan of sending Canadians to the front as such."

THE LATE MISS LATHERN

A Sachville letter says:—At the Ladies' College on last Thursday morning, Miss Laura Lathern, teacher of English and Latin in that institution, died. She was the eldest daughter of the late Rev. Dr. Lathern, for many years chairman of the Board of Regents of Mount Allison institutions. Her mother, who was a Miss Simpson of Fredericton, is also dead. One sister, Miss Lily Lathern, who resides in Yorkmouth, was with her when she died. Deceased graduated from Mount Allison University in 1891, and for twenty-one years was teacher in the Ladies' College. She was 48 years old. Miss Lathern was a lady of beautiful Christian character, and was beloved by hosts of friends who will hear of her death with keen regret.

REV. MR. DENNISON VICTIM OF ATTACK

Tells of Assault by Two Men in Street Last Night

A vicious attack upon Rev. F. P. Dennison, pastor of the Tabernacle Baptist church, as he was on his way home about midnight on Sunday, is reported. He said today that he was returning from the post office and in Charlotte street passed a man and woman who were sauntering along. They followed him as he turned up Coburg street, so he changed his direction and went down Union. In Waterloo street, near Golding, as he was heading into a blinding snow storm, a man stepped in front of him. Without other warning than the utterance of a vile epithet, he says, the man struck him across the front of his head with some instrument resembling a loaded section of rubber pipe. At the same time a woman stepped up behind him and swung a similar instrument, striking him in the face. Dazed and blinded by the blows he fell to the sidewalk, but struck out vigorously at the man and struck one of the two, but thought it was the woman. They then ran away. Mr. Dennison was able to proceed to the hospital. He received two badly contused wounds on the front of his head, one of them affecting his left eye. The wounds, while very painful, are not regarded as serious.
