Municipality to Encourage Shipbuilding

OPTION CANCELLED

Proposed Purchase of Alms House Dropped — Increase in Salary For Sheriff — New Street and Road

Councillor Frink introduced a motion which was carried after considerable discussion by 16 yeas to 8, at the municipal council meeting yesterday afternoon to the effect that the municipality of St. John should make it known at home and abroad that it was prepared to offer financial assistance to any shipbuilding corporation or company which would lay down a plant in the city.

Coun. McLellan moved at the meeting of the municipal council yesterday afternoon that his resolution passed at the last meeting of May 19, that an option be granted to the Eastern Trust Company for the purchase of the municipal home at \$75,000, be rescinded. The motion was carried unanimously, and the incident can now be considered closed.

In introducing his motion Coun. McLellan said he accepted the decision of the public as expressed in the newspapers, though he was not convinced that the press, which had so strongly criticized his action, was an adequate expression of public opinion. He had given his honest opinion of the value of the property, and believed that the action of the council in adopting his resolution has been condemned rather by a number of political henchmen and real estate makers, registry office and morgue and nothing more than sordid ruses by political influences.

The county secretary said he thought he ought to inform the council that the Eastern Trust Company would claim the right to hold the option, since they had deposited with him the sum of \$1, as called for.

Coun. McLellan said he knew that the company would take back the dollar and resign all claim in the matter.

Warden Carson said that he had consulted M. G. Tied before signing the option, and that he had acted on his advice not to do so, and that the option was consequently invalid.

Coun. McLellan concluded by saying that the object of the Eastern Trust Company was only to get the property out of the hands of the council till November 1.

His motion was then put to the vote and carried unanimously.

An application from Sheriff Stephen S. de Forest for an increase of salary was reported by Coun. McLellan, who made a motion that the sheriff receive a salary of \$8,700 per annum, on condition that he pay the salaries out of this sum of a janitor for the court house, registry office and morgue, and that he provide at his own expense a suitable person to be his deputy.

It was stated in the report that since his appointment he had not collected certain fees that he had been entitled to for attending different court sessions and that the increase in his salary would amount to a net sum of about \$815. The report was adopted.

A letter was received from the Fernhill Cemetery Company concerning the extension of the street from the corner of Kane's Corner. Warden Carson said that he had been over the ground with M. M. Hopper, who said that the plans should be prepared by the company's engineer and submitted to him as reported in The Telegraph. The plans had not yet been received.

A letter from the owners of the property known as Beacon street, between Bay Street and Sea, asking the county to take over the street was considered. The street is only 50 feet wide instead of the standard width of 66 feet but, considering the fact that the street is never likely to become an important thoroughfare, it was decided that it should be accepted, more especially as the lot is an exceptionally narrow one.

The resignation of Dr. L. M. Curran as a hospital commissioner was accepted and Dr. W. F. Roberts was elected in his place, on Coun. Wigmore's proposal.

There were fifteen applications considered by the board—ten males and five females, and of these ten were accepted—six males and four females, and four refused—three males and one female. One female patient left the hospital and one female accepted by the board did not enter.

Twelve regular meetings and two special meetings were held by the board and one meeting of the executive committee was held.

We do not deem it necessary to refer to the great interest which the Hon. Mr. Ellis took in the institution as we understand a resolution will be presented today upon which we shall be called to take action. His passing will prove a great loss to the institution as his services were invaluable.

Miss Ramsey and her capable nursing staff have, we believe, very faithfully carried out their duties, and being a particularly hard one on the nurses on account of the number of helpless and serious cases under their care.

To the medical staff we desire to tender our hearty thanks for their valuable services, always cheerfully and efficiently given.

The Women's Aid committee has, as in the past, rendered most valuable services which are most gratefully acknowledged.

Early in the year it was found necessary to overhaul the plumbing, and when the work was opened up a very serious state of affairs was disclosed, causing a menace to the inmates. This job cost over \$1,500, but was money well spent and today our sanitary arrangements are a credit to the institution.

One member of the board, J. S. Gregory, took an active interest in the work; in fact, he let no day pass without a personal inspection of the work in progress and made a gift of \$100 towards the expense. Another member, John Sealy, heartily seconded his efforts with a gift of \$25, and F. H. Flewelling, a friend of the institution, also contributed \$10 for this purpose. Other donations received during the year are as follows: L. C. Prime, \$100; St. John resident travelers, \$56.08; Gershon S. Mayes, \$50; James F. Robertson, \$20; John D. McIntyre, \$10; Mrs. Margaret Baxter, \$5; M. A. W., \$5; a friend per Dr. Walker, \$10.10.

This year it is hoped to install electric lighting, and we would appeal to all friends of the institution for help so that this safeguard to life and property may be realized without encroaching upon the invested funds.

To the friends who during the year aided us with money, donations of various articles or with sympathy we extend our grateful thanks.

To the Subscribers of the St. John Home for Incurables:

Ladies and Gentlemen—On behalf of the late treasurer, Hon. J. V. Ellis, I have the honor to report—First as to the W. W. Turnbull fund, the capital of the institution. At the close of the fiscal year 1912 this fund amounted to \$100,496.15. It has increased during the year to \$100,456.15 by the addition of two life membership fees—George Blake and E. Allan Schofield.

This fund is invested as per state-

ment annexed, in bonds, stocks and mortgages and a small portion is on deposit in the Bank of Nova Scotia. Other funds, which are held for the benefit of special inmates, amount to \$8,874.68.

The total amount held by the treasurer on behalf of the home and its funds, on July 5, 1913, was \$109,370.83.

The revenue account, which is the ordinary annual statement of receipts and expenditures, shows receipts, including a balance of \$2,306.29 from last year, as follows:

The expenditure was \$3,621.18, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,709.75.

AIRSHIP LINE IN THE WEST?

Promoter Sees Time When Mail Will Be Carried From Atlantic to Pacific in Two Days

Edmonton, Alta., July 16.—L. S. Lockwood and R. G. McLean of San Francisco, are in Edmonton to establish an airship line between this city and Athabasca, ninety-five miles, and Edmonton and Fort George, B. C., more than 400 miles. The hydroplane, capable of carrying 2,000 pounds, will be used. The company, backed by California and local capital, also plans to erect a factory in this city.

Mr. McLean said that, while it will be years before the aero line can compete with the railroads for passenger and freight traffic, the day is not far distant when the mail service, especially in this part of the country, will be handled by air ships. He said also that within two years a machine will be perfected to carry mail from the Atlantic ocean to the Pacific in less than two days, as against four to five days, now required.

MORNING LOCALS

A party of small boys in a motor boat with their engine stopped were caught in the whirlpools of the reversing falls last evening about two hours before high water. Only the providential starting of the engine in time, saved the boys from being swept into the swifter currents.

An American gray squirrel was shot by Rev. William Smith, of Gagetown, yesterday. The animal weighs one pound and seven ounces and is twenty-two inches long. It is the first specimen of its kind to be found in New Brunswick.

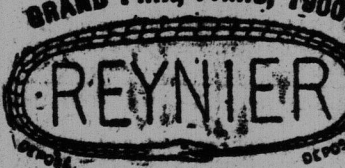

NO REDUCTION IN THE I. C. R. RATES

Ottawa, July 15.—The final accounts of the Intercolonial Railway of Canada for the fiscal year show a net surplus of \$800,000. This is about \$100,000 less than the estimate of the minister of railways when he made his annual statement in the house. Certain of the revenue accounts did not pan out quite as well as had been anticipated.

The agitation that is being raised in the lower provinces with reference to the new rates is not likely to result in any variation of the policy adopted by the management, and approved by the minister. It is claimed that the changes are almost wholly in local rates which dated back years and were inaugurated at a time when local influences and political conditions were big factors on the Intercolonial.

In time it is probable that all expenditures outside of construction will be charged to revenue, in which event the surplus will disappear, so that the management will be content in making ends meet.
