

Check belongs to B. R. McArthur, greenkeeper at the Oregon City Golf Club course.
He knows more golf etiquette better than many of the hole-in-one boys, and he has now learned to help his master hold down his job.
His principal job on the course is retrieving balls which have been misplayed into some new fairways planted parallel to several of the old ones. A slice can easily cause a ball to get lost in them. The club had to make it a rule that no one could go on the growing grass to recover his ball, but here is where Check comes in.
He has been trained to search for balls on the forbidden grounds, and he takes hundreds of them to the edge of the fairway where his master awaits him.
Check is efficient and for a time he attempted to carry two balls at once, but he found his mouth was too small. Check will not touch a ball in play on the regular fairways. He knows his job and sticks to it. He also knows the new seeded greens, and carefully walks around them.


