FRENCH SECURITY NEW CABINET'S AIM

VATICAN ENVOY AND FINANCE PLAN FAVORED

New Money Measures Proposed By New Ministry

CAILLAUX BOOED

Tempestuous Scene in Chamber As New Government Defines Its Programme

PARIS, April 21.—A tumult in the Chamber of Deputies and absolute silence in the Senate the ministerial declaration of the Painleve government when its reading began this afternoon.

PLANS ANNOUNCED

PARIS, April 21.—The ultimate imposition of drastic financial measures, maintenance of the embassy at the Vatican, and pacification of internal dissent, but above all real security for France, were the prime points in the ministerial declaration of the Painleve-Caillaux-Brand cabinet read in the Chamber of Deputies and the Senate this afternoon.

FINANCIAL ISSUE

Regarding the finances the statement declared: "When we have succeeded finally and definitely in balancing the budget, we will take the state out of the role of banker which it has been obliged to assume in the financial crisis of the nation."

FAVOR VATICAN ENVOY

The government pronounced in favor of the maintenance of a diplomatic representative at the Vatican, calling the official "a highly qualified representative" instead of an ambassador.

SECURITY FIRST

The declaration reaffirmed the Herriot ministry's policy of security and reassured Poland as to France's position on this question.

IN THE SENATE

During the reading of the declaration in the Senate there was applause only when Jules Steeg, Minister of Justice, joyiced the passage regarding the security of Europe. There was ironical laughter at the phrase "no useless controversies."

HER GRANDMOTHER ALSO IS NEAR DEATH FROM SHOCK

HOME IS BURNED

Youngster Is Not Seen After Discovery of Flames—Woods Take Fire

By Canadian Press. FREDERICTON, April 21.—Rossey Banks, aged five, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Banks, who are at Saint John, was burned to death, and her grandmother, Mrs. Edward Banks, aged almost 70, is in a critical condition from shock and may die, as the result of a fire which destroyed the home of Edward Banks, at Burton, Sunbury county, this morning.

ASLEEP IN BED

The fire is supposed to have started from a defective fuse, and the little girl, who had been asleep in her bed on the second floor, was never seen by any of the occupants after the flames broke out.

HOME DESTROYED

Within half an hour after the fire broke out the whole building had been destroyed, and a short time later fire broke out in the woods nearby, probably having been ignited from sparks carried from the burning house by the wind.
