Important matters were discussed at the meeting of the Board of Trade Council yesterday and others had to be postponed until a meeting to be held on next Tuesday at 11 a.m., owing to the amount of time taken up by yesterday's conference with the lumbermen.

Among the subjects discussed yesterday was the way in which the board could best serve the interests of its members and the community at large and it was decided to send a questionnaire to each member asking opinions on this matter. When the answers have been received they will be carefully gone over to see what action can be taken. The board also invites constructive suggestions from any citizen along these lines.

The cumbersome tax income statement of Canada was discussed and the secretary was instructed to write and see what progress had been made in having it simplified.

**WEST INDIES TRADE.**  
A communication from Hon. T. A. Low, minister of commerce, asked for suggestions from the board to be presented at the coming conference in Ottawa, with representatives of the British West Indies on the subjects of cable and wireless communication, steamship communication and tariff regulations between the two countries. This was referred to a committee who are working on the matter.

A copy of proposed amendments to the port wardens regulations, prepared by R. R. Lee and J. A. Mowry, recently appointed to the office of port wardens, and sent by Commissioner Bullock to the board for suggestions, had been referred to a committee. The committee reported that they had taken the matter up with the shipping people and they expressed themselves satisfied with the present regulations and saw no reason for any change.

**CIVIL SERVICE POST.**  
An inspector of weights and measures for the Saint John inspection district is being sought by the Department of Trade and Commerce. The new man is to fill the position left vacant by J. A. Bernier, Edmundston, who retired under the terms of the Calder Act last October. Since that time the staff here has been running short handed. It was said this morning that several applicants had filled out the necessary papers and would try the necessary examinations.

## Furniture Sold To Satisfy Half-Cent Taxation Claim

PARIS, May 8.—A singular comedy of bureaucracy, in which it would seem that authority must play the part of Pantaloon, has just been concluded in Paris, when furniture belonging to M. Bardin, a merchant living in Faubourg Saint Martin, was sold by auction in order to satisfy a tax collector's claim. M. Bardin recently received from a tax collector a notification that, owing to an error he still owed the State 11 centimes—that is, about half a cent—on account of last year's taxes. In view of the insignificance of the claim M. Bardin did not think it worth while either to waste the time or pay the 2c.

## RECALLS STIRRING 1914 NIGHT HERE

Death of Admiral Sturdee Brings to Mind Celebration in Saint John.

The death of Admiral Sir Doveton Sturdee, hero of the Falkland Islands battle, reminds many Saint John people of the ferocious night in 1914, when first word of the glorious defeat of Admiral Von Spee trickled through by roundabout cable into this city. It was in the early evening and the city was extra lively because of recruiting activities and the constant excitement which marked the opening year of the war. Giving color to the naval news, several hundred British bluejackets en route from the Bermuda station to join the grand fleet at home, were roaming about the streets and helping fill the theatres. In one of the picture houses the staff gathered 20 or 30 of the biggest and best looking Jackies and during an interval in the programme announcement was made from the stage that Admiral Sturdee had wiped out the enemy. At a signal the British sailors marched smartly on to the stage, flood lights were turned on and the orchestra boomed out "Rule Britannia." The vast audience rose to its feet with a mighty cheer, which continued for fully five minutes as the Jack Tars stood sharply at the salute and the musicians kept repeating the thrilling strain.




