"CY" DENNENY MOST EFFECTIVE PLAYER TO DATE IN N. H. L.

MONTEALS ARE "BAD" TEAM OF MAJOR CIRCUIT

Maroon Forwards Have Had 67 Penalties Handed Out

MONTREAL, Jan. 7.—"Cy" Denny, left wing star of the Ottawa Senators, stands out as the most effective player in the first three of the National Hockey League campaign, according to official statistics released yesterday by President Calder. Denny not only leads in the greatest number of goals scored, with 12 to his credit, but also has recorded the greatest number of assists, seven in all, giving him a total of 19 points, which is six above the total points credited to Nelson Stewart, Montreal Maroon center, who has scored ten goals and is credited with three assists.

But what makes Denny's record the more brilliant is that he has played thus effectively while incurring only one minor penalty to date, that being awarded in the game against the Canadiens here when he committed some heavy play and got into a melee with Albert Leduc.

Montreal Maroons are the bad team of the league according to the penalty sheet officially released. Montreal has drawn 104 minor penalties and four majors in thirteen games, while the nearest club to them, New York, has only 67 and Canadiens and Ottawa 68 each, which is just about ratio for these clubs in past seasons.

The Maroons not only hold the "bad" record as a team, but have the three worst offenders, strangely enough, the three regular forwards, Broadbent, toppling the list with 22 minors and two majors; Stewart having 21 minors and one major and Siebert having 21 minors.

GAMES TONIGHT
MONTREAL, Jan. 7.—For the fifth consecutive home game at the forum, the Montreal Maroons will play before a capacity crowd, when they meet the league-leading Ottawa Senators here tonight. The game will be the fourth waged between the two teams, which are battling for the top position in the N. H. L. race.

Ottawa won the first game at home to start the campaign, and Montreal closed up with a tie to one. Tonight, the club supporters will be out in force to lend all the moral support they can to the home team in its fight for the leading role. Ottawa, while being full strength for tonight's game, Frank Nighbor having recovered from his recent indisposition, while Hooley Smith is again at his best, after being out with an infected foot.

Montreal, however, will likely be without Hooley Smith, who is suffering from water on the knee, the result of a blow across the knee received early in the game at Ottawa on Tuesday night.

IN NEW YORK
At Gotham, the Boston team, with two straight victories behind them, meet the New York combination and a third consecutive Boston victory would not come as a surprise. The Bruins seem to have emerged from the woods and are out with the determined purpose to climb from the lowly places they have been inhabiting since they jumped into pro. hockey one year and a half ago.

There is no change in the case of Billy Boucher, suspended Canadian player. There is a feeling that Boucher may be reinstated by President Calder, in time for him to get into Saturday's game against New York. But the league president is noncommittal on this score. However, a meeting of the league directors is to be held Sunday and, if Boucher is not reinstated before the gathering convenes, it is quite likely his case will be discussed then by the directors.

Toronto Varsity Beats Harvard, 2-0
BOSTON, Jan. 6.—Toronto University defeated Harvard 2 to 0 in a night and no revenge for a defeat administered by the Americans a year ago.

Tonight the story was a different one from the last meeting for the experienced Canadians were never in danger from the willow, rather saw crimson sweat, and the advantage of Toronto was much greater than the score indicated.

CUT DOWN LEAD
VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 7.—Out-scoring Jack McMillan, Canadian champion, to the extent of 1,393 to 856, in the third day's play of their 8,000 point match here, Stanley Newman, English cyclist, cut down the Canadian champion's lead to 516, and at the close of play last night the scores were: McMillan (received \$500), 5,015; Newman, 4,000. Newman's chief breaks were 180, 173, 161, 111, 99, 91 and 97, unfinished, while McMillan could do no better than 71, 89 and 84.

MR. GORMAN RETURNS
SCIENTISTS, doctors, and philosophers have spent much time debating the question of "Mind vs. Muscle." In the world of sport, it is a debatable question also but the rather hoary dictum "a good big man can beat a good little man" still holds pretty good. Once again, while by a clever piece of work, the follow not possessing the same amount of brawn as the other fellow triumphs. More often, he does not.

A case rather recent was the Berlinbach-Delany fight. Mr. Berlinbach has a single track mind with plenty of muscle. Mr. Delany, according to most sport writers, is the finest piece of fighting machinery in the world today but he lacks the muscle. After socking Mr. Berlinbach one on the jaw recently in the fourth round, Mr. Delany thought he had won a world's title but "Punch" Em' Paul's single track mind got to work and in the end, he hung on to his precious crown. Muscle had triumphed again.

WILL MUSCLE triumph at the world's speed-skating meet here on January 26, 27 and 28?

It is hard to say, boys, but if you want to get an idea of how Mr. Clas Thunberg thinks it will be decided, just imagine it is a few days ago and the scene is Madison Square Garden, the Temple of Sportism.

A small group is standing near the ice surface. Included in it are Thunberg, Hugo Quist, Paavo Nurmi's manager, who is acting in a similar capacity for Thunberg, Charlie Gorman, who had just won the Middle Atlantic crown, and others.

While they were talking—Mr. Quist acting as interpreter—Mr. Thunberg unexpectedly reached down and pinched the calf of Charlie's legs and then felt the thick muscles of his legs.

Mr. Thunberg did not waste any time trying to find out how much Charlie knew about calculus and the system invented by Mr. Pythagoras to test the schoolboys. The Flying Finn showed he was not concerned about Mr. Gorman's brainpower.

He was very deeply interested in Mr. Gorman's muscle.

Mr. Thunberg rather rightly feels that muscle and condition are going to tell the tale here in a few weeks' time.

History records that Mr. Thunberg is on the right track.

Another gentleman who feels that same way about it is Charles Jewtraw. He is quietly preparing himself at Saranac Lake.

"THE NEWBURGH meet this year," says Charlie, who returned yesterday, "was one of the biggest they ever held. There was not much of a crowd out in the morning but in the afternoon, I can well believe in all my life. I never saw so much enthusiasm in all my life. In the evening, they tendered us a banquet. Prior to going to the meet, I was at Madison Square Garden and saw the St. Pat and New York team in action. Homeed, our own Saint John team gives us more action.
