- A. I could not tell you sir.

- A. He did not do a thing.
- Q. Did he put in---
- A. He only put a small stable there, 12 X 11.
- Q. And he got the lumber or logs to build that out

of what?

- A. Out of his own ----
- Q. He put a small stable there did he? A. Yes.
- Q. That is all the improvements he made there?
- A. Yes, that is all.
- Q. Do you know the value of the stable?
- A. It is worth \$4.
- Q. Anything else that he put on there?
- A. None that I know of. He fixed up my fathers old house.
- Q. And he has been on the lot ever since?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And is he there now? A. Yes.

- Q. Does he take Treaty? A. Yes, sir.
- Q. How old are you now, when were you born?
- A. I could not tell you, I am fifty-seven.
- Q. Where were you at the time the troops came up the river?
- A. At my fathers
