

ALBIONS DROP GAME TO VERNON

BURRARD GETS HOME IN SMALL LIMIT

Victoria Shows Portland Men How to Make Runs and Get Wickets.

(From Thursday's Daily).

The beautiful uncertainty of cricket was once more exemplified at Beacon Hill park yesterday when the Vernon eleven beat the Albions by a close margin of nine runs, although Vernon was beaten by Portland on Monday. It was emphasized by the fact that the lottery of the game called the Albions to play with one man short in the second innings. Full credit for the second innings, full credit for yesterday's victory, and especially team from the interior and especially team to Williams, who in the second innings was unfortunately run out when his score stood at 74, made by fine cricket. Lawrence in the same innings made 25 and Morrell 21. Toward the close of the match excitement ran high and became intense when man after man went to the wicket with but a few runs to get to win. A mighty cheer was turned into a roar when Hubbell finally bowled Gardner for one. White, the last man, being absent through business, the innings closed and the Albions, Trimen got 5 for 20 and Menzies, 11 for 36, including the hat-trick. The best Albion score was 41, made by Briggs in the second innings.

Victoria vs. Portland.

Victoria scored an easy win against Portland, making 249 in the first innings, while in two tries Portland succeeded in getting exactly 90. Gooch, with 6 for 17, and York, with 3 for 10, were responsible for the collapse in the first innings, while Meredith obtained 12 for 23 and Barnacle 1 for 21 in the second. The three first named bowlers were practically unplayable, Gooch being especially so, his curly hair holding up every batsman of the Portland side that was called upon to face them. An instance of his bowling was shown in his retirement of Blakeley, whose balls were tipped by a dandy leg break. As he retired to the pavilion, Blakeley exclaimed, "I thought it was a wide." The honor of the tournament, however, so far goes to H. Gillespie, who yesterday continued his 123 (not out) in the first innings and completed his innings being the last man out for the handsome score of 143, which is the third highest score made in Victoria in tournament cricket, the others being by Rhodes, who holds the record with 170, while Cobbett holds the record for the hospital ground with 166 made two years ago. The three Victorian batsmen who settled matters for the winners were Gooch, Barnacle and Meredith. The partnership between Gillespie and Barnacle was responsible for 71 runs and that of Gillespie and Meredith for 77. Victoria, far from being behind in which position the local men are on a par with Vancouver. The Portland men tried the whole bowling strength of their team, the best of whom was Lawrence, who secured 5 for 52. Greig and Bailey got two each and Fenwick and Warren bowled unsuccessfully having 52 runs hit off them. Greig cost the side 57 runs and Bailey's two wickets were obtained at an average of 23 apiece. The highest Portland score was made by Fenwick, the captain, who in the second innings made 19 carefully. The only other double figure man on the side was Lawrence, who was 11 not out in the first innings.

Garrison vs. Burrard.

Burrard had an easy day at the Garrison disposing of the home men with eight wickets and 2 runs to spare. The winners, however, had to force the pace to get the runs in time before the drawing of stumps. The batsmen to win the game in the second innings were: Rhodes, 8; Clarence, 17, and Shotton 32 (not out), the balance of 7 being extras. Rhodes, in his score, obtained three sixes and a long line of fours. Of the bowling Williamson, 4 for 34, and none for 21, and Askey, 6 for 61, were the best, the latter bowler getting the only two wickets. For Burrard, Pettley got 4 for 27 (the first innings being 4 for 52), and Rhodes 7 for 56. (See captured 4 for 18).

The Attendances.

At all the grounds there were good attendances yesterday. At Beacon Hill between thirty and forty ladies visited the ground during the morning and afternoon while scores of enthusiasts were present before and after the lunch adjournment. The management of the tournament speak of the patronage extended as satisfactory and remark that the interest in the greatest of games is on the increase in this city. The three grounds were all thronged with a plentiful supply of lunch at midday. The visiting teams were last night taken for a trip up the Gorge in the Craigflower and spent a right rosy time.

Garrison's Opponents

MAKE GARRISON FINISH

Burrard Makes 118 Runs in 57 Minutes for Two Wickets Down.

When the Burrard and Garrison teams went in to tea at the Garrison grounds at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon with the Garrison playing its second innings with only one wicket down and 49 runs in the lead, both players and spectators thought that the soldiers had a sure thing of it. The splendid bowling of Williamson hit the fourth stump, and the third for the latter team down to 74 runs in their first innings against the Garrison's 88, which gave the soldiers a starter of 19 points, when they went in to bat again at 3:30.

Corp. A. Thomas, whose batting was a feature of the Garrison's innings both Tuesday and yesterday, got 26, before he was caught at slip by Clarence, Askey was doing well and had secured 10 by good hard hitting when he was given out by L. B. W. on a ball from Shotton. Robertson, Williamson, Isbister and Bennett all made good scores by good steady batting and when the side was retired at 5:30 o'clock the soldiers had run 97 runs, making a total for their two innings of 190.

It seemed next to impossible that Burrard would be able to make the 117 runs which were required to beat the soldiers, with only an hour left to play, but this they did, thanks largely to the splendid work of E. Rhodes.

He made three sixes, sending the ball on the first drive over the right screen at the far end of the field, the second over the picket fence, and the third for a smashing hit over the dressing room. Shotton also batted splendidly, making 32 (not out), and E. Clarence batted consistently for 17.

Rhodes was caught out by Warden at 27 minutes after 8, just after Shotton had ticked off the one hundred and eighteenth run. This gave them the game by 2 runs and 8 wickets.
