We have always held that Sydney or Halifax should be the western Atlantic terminus for fast mail and passenger steamers, in both summer and winter, while St. John should be the terminus all the year round for the fast freighters.

It is clear that all the worry and scheming and thoughts of "deals," etc. are in the opposition camp, for the Premier is in Great Britain enjoying a well-earned holiday and his colleagues of the executive are administering provincial affairs in the usual careful way.

Liverpool Spruce Market. In its Liverpool journal, the London Timber Trade Journal of 12th inst., says:—"Without being fat in any sense, there is an absence of buoyancy in all the white wood departments of the trade, and we seem to be going along on the same level path which has characterized our market for several weeks past."

The Growing Time. Canada's aggregate foreign trade for the year ending June 30th has exceeded the most sanguine expectations of our people. It amounted to \$414,517,355, or \$56,827,573 more than the previous year.

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Canadian Pacific. AN ESTIMATE OF INCOME. The annual report of the Canadian Pacific which will be issued this fall, will contain several features worthy of note. The gross account will show not merely substantial increases in gross earnings and in expenses, but will also present some changes in items, particularly in "other incomes" and fixed charges.

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NEWS AND NOTES. Manitoba's wheat and hay crops are reported to be very promising. A \$2,000,000 fire took place on 16th at Guayquil, Ecuador.

The island of St. Vincent is earthquake and its inhabitants are in consternation. There will be a coronation naval review of Portsmouth, Eng., on 11th August—the second day of the London pageant.

A tornado in Baltimore unroofed hundreds of houses, uprooted trees in the parks and killed eleven persons on Sunday last.

The King has decided not to re-appoint special foreign representatives to attend the coronation on August 9. The resident ambassadors will take their place.

The Mississippi has overflowed its banks in Iowa and Missouri, inundating hundreds of farms and plantations. The damage is estimated at \$5,000,000.

The ladies of Cape Town presented Mrs. Bryn with £1,000 before she sailed for Europe with her husband, the ex-Premier of the Orange River Colony, who is seriously ill.

A sea-fall at the Canadian Northern Railway's new elevator at Port Arthur gave way the other day, allowing three tons to fall 90 feet. Two were killed and the legs of the other were broken.

Hon. Joseph Chamberlain is able to appoint to his public office, Saturday 19, an injury he received by being thrown out of his house in a London street. He carries a scar on his face, however, which, it is said, will remain for his lifetime, although it is not a very disfigurement.

The peace in the Philippines proclaimed by President Roosevelt has turned out to be a par with the end of the South African War announced by Lord Roberts when he left Kitchener to take the heaviest and still opposing against the belligerents in the Philippines.

The Telegram's cable from London says:—"Nothing has been officially reported of the message of the provincial premiers and ministers from Canada, who are here at present, but it is understood they have discussed the important question of securing better terms for the provinces from the dominion. An increase has been proposed for all the provinces and its adoption would mean an increase of half a million per annum in revenue for Ontario, and other provinces in proportion."

The maritime provinces, Messrs. Tweedie, Murray and Peters, desire that the management of the railway award should be divided amongst the maritime provinces. They think they would have a good claim in arbitration on account of their great fishing trade.

The question of precedence given to the provincial premiers and cabinet ministers in the dominion was discussed. At present the provincial ministers rank after dominion members of parliament and at the option of those at the conference is very strong to the effect they should rank after the dominion cabinet ministers.

A decision of importance has been rendered by St. Louis Judge named Siderer. The parents of Willie Quinn brought action against Abram Simon for keeping a dog, Jupiter by name, which had bitten and wounded and otherwise injured Willie. The defence, among other things was that Willie wilfully, maliciously and of malice aforethought attempted to fasten, attach and tie a tin can, or vessel made of tin, to the tail or hind appendage of the dog, with intent to injure or maim the said dog previous to his being put in contact with Willie.

John W. Bookwalter, of Springfield, Ohio, has been offered and refused to buy a dog, which he had bought for \$25, in which he had invested \$100,000. A special London cable says:—"The preliminary first-line negotiations between the Canadian ministers and Sir Christopher Furness and the Elder-Dempsters are still proceeding. The next step apparently will be to endeavor to induce Mr. Chamberlain to increase the British subsidy, which is now pledged at £75,000 against Canada's £250,000. That, however, must await Mr. Chamberlain's resumption of business."

The general synod of the church of England in Canada will hold its next quadrennial meeting in Montreal commencing Wednesday, September 3. The synod will be called upon this year to transact the most important business that has ever come before it. Efforts will be made to consolidate still further the church of Canada, and the delegates will be asked to formulate a union relation to divorce and remarriage. Then the missionary work of the church will be thoroughly inquired into, and some definite plan will doubtless be devised for the future of the church in both the home and foreign mission fields.

A cable message has been received at the military department, Ottawa, from Sir Fredrick Borden, authorizing the despatch to England of one officer and thirteen mounted men to represent Canada in the colonial review on the occasion of King Edward's Coronation. They will sail by the Allan Line Pretoria on Saturday. Thirteen Canadians were specially picked for the King's escort for the 26th of June. The list includes a very large number of the same individuals as to be chosen again, but if they find it impossible to get away the vacancies are to be filled from the ranks of the contingent that was over in June.

The Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company announces that they will send commercial messages to Canada before December. The rate will be 6d a word for private messages

and 3d a word for press messages. Signor Marconi joined the Italian Republic Carlo Alberto on July 7, when she went to Coratraz, whether she had been ordered in connection with King Victor Emmanuel's visit to the Czar. Marconi at once installed a wireless apparatus on board the warship. He telegraphed the Marconi Company that he had received messages from Poldia, the station, on the Cornwall coast, at Cape Skogan and signals at Coratraz. The distances are respectively 550 and 1,400 miles from Poldia, from England at its widest point, and a part of Denmark. He added that, his new magnetic receivers beat all others in sensitiveness.

The annual report of the Fishery Board for Scotland gives the results of the series of salmon-marking experiments which have been carried out on the Tay, Tweed and other rivers. Metal labels were attached to a large number of captured kelt, the labels being numbered and the fish when recaptured identified thereby. The records show that the popular notion that a salmon always returns to its native river has a basis in a rule with exceptions. Of twenty-four marked fish which were recaptured in rivers after the lapse of at least one season, fifteen had come back to the river in which they had been marked; five went to other rivers, but of these five only one went to a river very far away. The salmon which had the longest record for long marking was a Norwegian fish which, having been marked and released in the Airdrie River, was recaptured two and one-half years afterward on the Trodbrunn Fjord, 500 miles distant.

A big oil well in Louisiana—a gusher—broke the other day and it burned about all the oil that "gushed" together with all the structures and other "fluff" available, but in consequence the black smoke was seen by people over a radius of 40 miles and the flames lit up the country over more than an equal area. The owners imported a car load of chemicals with which to extinguish the burning oil but it refused to be put out. Then they offered a reward of \$10,000 to anyone who would stop the burning. About ten steam boilers were put in position near the gusher, with the view of turning steam on the flames on systematic, scientific principle by which it was hoped they would be blown out as candle or other small fires by one's breath properly directed. This scheme was entirely successful and the flames were extinguished. Our Memorabilia friends watched the outcome of this experiment with interest for a similar experience may, sometime, be theirs.
