### CITY WILL PROBABLY RETURN TO THE WARD SYSTEM OF ELECTING ALDERMEN FORMERLY IN VOGUE

The members of the Common Council are likely to be elected again by the ward system. A bill will probably be introduced into the legislature at the coming session to bring this about. A meeting of the bills and by-laws committee was held last night at City Hall, Ald. Baxter presiding. It was decided to advertise the new assessment law. A special meeting of the committee will be held to discuss this act as soon as the suggestions of the Board of Trade in regard to the act are received. The committee spent some time in the revision of the permanent street bill as instructed by council. The committee decided to recommend

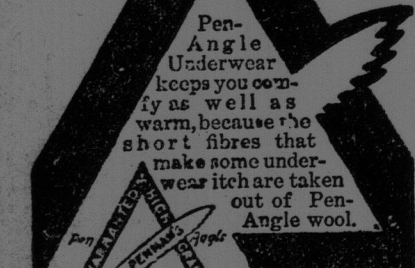
a change in the form of city leases, and thus simplify the process of arbitration. They recommend a change in the hours for receiving ballots at civic elections, and favor a return to the former hours of 8 a. m. to 4 p. m. They recommend a bill to validate the bond issue which is to be taken up by the Bank of Commerce providing for the registration of the issue. Civic representation was discussed, and the board decided to recommend that the council should in future be composed of one alderman to represent each ward with four aldermen-at-large. The number of aldermen would thus be increased by two.

### ST. STEPHEN WOMAN ENTERS ACTION AGAINST TOWN FOR \$2,000

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., Jan. 11.—Through her attorney, M. MacDonagh, E. C. Mrs. Mary McKay, an aged resident of Calais, has brought action in the New Brunswick supreme court against the town of St. Stephen for damages placed at two thousand dollars, because of injuries sustained about three months ago on King street. T. B. McManus, Ltd., contractors for water works construction, were excavating for pipe laying and are alleged to have left a trench twenty inches deep open and unguarded at the corner of King and Prince William streets. Mrs. McKay was being driven in a stable team, the wheels of which went into this trench. She was thrown out with great force and sustained severe cuts of the face and head, bruises on the body and a general nervous shock, from which she has not recovered. The present action is brought against the town, but the contract between J. B. McManus, Ltd., and the corporation holds the former responsible to the town in all such premises as that on which the action is brought.

BERLIN, Jan. 10.—Illustrative of the severity of the sentences imposed by the military courts is the case of two reservists, who, when returning from the shooting butts entered a dancing saloon, where a patrol found them dancing. Each was sentenced to three years' imprisonment.

### EVERYTHING GOING UP BUT WAGES

The police of the city will shortly petition the Council for an increase in wages. The matter has been talked of for some time, and the men will soon send in the petition. They claim that the cost of living has greatly increased in the past few years, that rents and taxes are higher, in short, that their present pay is insufficient to supply their needs. The men will ask for an increase of twenty-five cents a day. At the present time the deputy chief gets \$2.25 a day; the detective and sergeants get \$2 a day; and the patrolmen get \$1.75 a day. There are forty-one on the force at the present time, so that the increase, if granted, would mean an increase of \$10.25 a day in the city's expenditures. The petition will be sent in before the estimates for the year are decided upon.

### SUSSEX MAN DIED OF PARALYSIS

SUSSEX, Jan. 11.—Clarke Teakles died at his home, Lowell street, this afternoon at 5 o'clock of paralysis, aged 70 years. Mr. Teakles was stricken with paralysis five weeks ago today. Deceased leaves a widow and one son, A. B. Teakles, dentist, of Sussex and Miss Edith M. at home. Harry Teakles, late of the firm of Humphrey & Teakles, is a brother. The funeral will be held on Sunday afternoon at 2.30 o'clock. Interment at the Sussex Corner burying ground.

### WOULD ARRANGE FOR BETTER TRANSPORTATION OF FRESH FISH

OTTAWA, Jan. 11.—The government is negotiating with the railways to arrange a system by which fresh fish could be transported inland from the Atlantic and Pacific coasts for domestic consumption. The plan is not worked out yet, but will include cold storage transit and at terminals. It is expected to benefit both the fishermen and consumers. Twenty-five thousand dollars will be voted to make a beginning.

STRASSBURG, Germany, Jan. 11.—Twenty persons were killed today by the explosion of a vat of boiling celluloid in a bookbindery at Gelsolsheim owned by an English firm, Houdart & Co. The flaming liquid was thrown over rooms where many men and women were at work, and caused such instantaneous ignition of everything with which it came in contact that all the exits were cut off. Some of those who escaped from the burning rooms were terribly scalded.
