

STRASSBURG, Germany, Jan. 11.—
Twenty persons were killed today by the explosion of a vat of boiling celluloid in a bookbindery at Geispolsheim owned by an English firm, Houdert & Co. The flaming liquid was thrown over rooms where many men and women were at work, and caused such instantaneous ignition of everything with which it came in contact that all the exits were cut off. Some of those who escaped from the burning rooms were terribly scalded.
