HER DEATH RECALLS SACRIFICE OF WEALTH

Persuaded Husband to Destroy Secret of Unquenchable Fire.

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—The woman who once placed the good of humanity above hundreds of thousands of dollars, and caused to be destroyed the secret of a projectile deadly in warfare, died last night in her home in Brooklyn today. She was Mrs. Elizabeth F. Greenough, widow of Professor Benjamin F. Greenough, whose combustible that could not be quenched by water, was hurled by federal gunboats into the sea from the Greek fire, once used for the destruction of ancient cities. He was just enough of the state to the government to be used with terrifying effect at the bombardment of the Confederate city. Then at the instance of Washington he refused to supply, and later, refusing to sell the secret to the Russian government for something over \$1,000,000 he gave the formula and died with his secret.
At the outbreak of the Civil War Professor Greenough furnished some Greek fire shells to the government upon the understanding that they should not be used save in the defence of Washington. Greenough learned they were used at Charleston, he became angered and wrote to his wife for advice.
