HAZEN TRIES TO SHUT OFF EXPOSURE OF IRREGULARITIES

FREDERICTON, N. B., April 28.—The House met at 11.15 o'clock. Mr. Lezer (Westmorland) inquired if it was the intention of the government to have the amended highway act printed in French as well as in English for general distribution.

Mr. Hazen replied that he thought it very proper that this should be done. He would have full opportunity to appear with such evidence as he had to offer. If it was shown that Mr. Lezer was not a fit man to be retained in office, he would give his resignation.

Synops of Canadian North-west Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Canadian Imports for Month of March Totalled \$33,863,262

RATES VS. SEPARATES

The total reserve increased \$153,000; circulation decreased \$260,000; bullion increased \$33,816; other securities decreased \$252,000; other deposits decreased \$438,000; public deposits increased \$24,000; notes reserve increased \$215,000; government securities unchanged.

OTTAWA, Ont., April 28.—The final figures of Canada's trade for the last fiscal year issued today by the customs department show total imports amounting to \$24,123,732, a decrease of \$69,249,733 as compared with the preceding year, and total exports of domestic products amounting to \$28,922,358, a decrease of \$3,446,558.

The trade for March shows continued evidence of an encouraging outlook for a large increase in this year's trade. The imports totalled \$23,942,372, an increase of \$3,113,120. Exports totalled \$18,597,374, an increase of \$45,437. During the year coin and bullion to the value of \$5,858,443 was imported, as compared with \$6,548,661 during 1907-08. The value of coin and bullion exported was only \$1,597,728, as compared with \$1,657,614.

During the preceding year the grand total of Canadian trade was \$56,624,931, as compared with \$53,280,291 for 1907-08.

HEROIC NUN GIVES LIFE TO SAVE A COMPANION

Hurls Sister Aside as Run-away Horse Dashes on Them

NEW YORK, April 28.—Hurling her companion aside to safety and thereby sacrificing her own chance of escape, Sister Angela, a nun of the Dominican Order, was run down and instantly killed by a delivery wagon today. The nun, with another sister, was on her way to visit an ill woman. The two nuns were walking through Sixty-third street, and as they started to cross Third avenue did not see a runaway horse attached to a heavily loaded delivery wagon rushing down the street.

THOS. MCGILLEN NOT DANGEROUSLY HURT

Thomas McGillen, who is in the hospital as the result of wounds received from an Italian laborer on the G. T. P., on which he was engaged as a stevedore, is getting better rapidly. Doctors say that his wounds are not serious and that he is not now or ever has been in a precarious condition as was rumored. The affair took place at Coal Creek, on the work being done under Contractor Corbett and Pioschki and was the result of a reprimand given to the workman.
