Howard preached from the words— "Comfort ye, comfort ye my people." The sermon was well freighted with thought, and full of warning and encouragement. A very promising social service was then held, and it was decided that Bro. Nobles should assist the pastor, Bro. Hayward, during the week in special services. We expect to hear good news from these meetings.

Dr. Day, at the missionary meeting, being called upon, laid before the people, in his easy and happy manner, the Convention scheme and his method for working it, whereupon, Rev. T. A. Blackadar moved, seconded by Rev. E. F. Fillmore, that the pastors and delegates present do all they can to carry into effect the plan proposed. Motion passed without a dissenting voice.

The next Quarterly Meeting is to be entertained, at Prince William, commencing Friday, 19th of December, at 7 p. m. Collections for Convention Scheme amounted to \$10.27, which was handed to Dr. Day, the financial agent of the Convention.

**GENERAL.**  
—The Baptist denomination has in the United States seven theological seminaries, twenty-nine universities and colleges, twenty-three seminaries for female education exclusively, including Yassar, the largest college in the land; thirty-seven academies and seminaries for males and females combined; fifty institutions for the colored race and Indians. One hundred institutions in all, with buildings valued at \$8,170,443, and an endowment of \$7,896,328.—*Exchange.*

**—The queen of the South Sea Islands** is now personally laboring in the gospel for the salvation of another tribe who killed her husband.—Christianity is protected as the State religion in Madagascar. The total population of the island is estimated there at 350,000. During the last fourteen years about 700 Protestant churches have been built in that country, and all free of debt. There are in all 1,200 Protestant churches, with 80,000 communicants. There are self-supporting, and last year gave \$20,000 for missions. Education is compulsory. One district alone returns 100,000 pupils in the schools.

**—The Baptist Clergy**, after a visit to Lebanon, Tenn., says, on the authority of citizens of that place, that of the 300 converts in the meeting of Rev. "Sam." Jones there last April, hardly a single one shows his conversion; those who ran well for a season have fallen away. This is very sad if true.

**—The average Sunday plate collection** of the Rev. C. H. Spurgeon's congregation, in the great Tabernacle, is \$345.

**—Dr. Galusha Anderson**, late president of Chicago University, has received a call from the first Baptist church, Salem, Mass., to become their pastor. He has accepted the call.
