The First Marines. The marines were first established in 1664, when a corps was formed to supply trained sailors for the fleet. The merchant navy at that time was not large enough to supply the king's ships, and the impressed-men were in general unruly. A certain number of marines were theretore placed in each ship to keep the crew in order. Thus at first marines were trained sailors, and not soldiers, although at that time, and both before and alter, the fighting in man-of-war was cone by soldiers. No special regiment was set apart for this duty, but sometimes one and sometimes another was employed. The duke of York (alterward James II.) was in command of a regiment which was for some time employed in this way.
