

CITIZENS TELL OF WORK DONE BY CHIEF OF POLICE CLARK

Found him efficient considering number of Officers at his command - Chief on stand speaks of his system and duties.

The police enquiry was continued yesterday, D. Mullin acting for the Chief and the Recorder for the city. F. G. Spencer said a year and a half ago Com. McLellan had said some things uncomplimentary about the Chief to him, but the expression did not relate to the Chief's work. Senator J. W. Daniel was formerly Mayor for two years and three years as an alderman of St. John. He saw a good deal of the Chief while in civil politics. He thought the Chief discharged his duties very well, he did not know of any member of the Chief's staff who had ever quarrelled with the Chief, or of Ald. Maxwell's relations with the Chief. He thought the Chief should have had more men; the city was growing, but he did not feel about it strongly enough to make a fight for an increase. Mr. Baxter-You were a member of the Tax Reduction Association? A-Yes, so were you. Our plea was rather expensive than tax reduction. To Mr. Mullin witness said he did not know of any member of the Chief's staff board declaring he would not accept responsibility for the police force. The old council always backed up the police force; you could not have a good police force otherwise. He thought a difference between the commissioner and the Chief, called to bring the force into contempt and weaken its influence.

Tells of Prompt Work. D. B. Pledge said his store was burglarized five years ago. He reported to the police and Detective Klien arrested two men, who were found guilty. He got his goods back. Three years ago his store was broken into and Detective Klien arrested the burglar. He got his goods back. In both cases he had suspicions as to who made the breaks. Everett Jones, of M.R.A., saw the Chief quite frequently regarding thefts and irregularities. He found him courteous and prompt, and considered him as well as his deputy, very capable in dealing with complaints. He had no occasion to find fault with the Chief's work. As chief he felt the Chief was not getting the support he ought to and the force was insufficient. He thought the Chief was doing as well as anybody could in the same circumstances. To Mr. Baxter he said it wasn't right for policemen on duty to loaf in hotels. In M.R.A.'s the head might not know an explosive was loading, John McColtrick, ex-alderman, was chairman of Board of Safety from 1895 to 1899. The chief attended board meetings and took part in discussions. He never had any difficulty with the chief. The chief carried out orders of the Safety Board. He thought the chief did his work as well as could be expected with the number of men he had.

Mr. Baxter said sometimes there was friction between the chief and some members of the board. Members wanted officers on certain streets, and the chief explained he hadn't men to spare. Frank E. Williams told of several cases of burglary in which the police had convicted the culprits. He considered the chief was very sharp in looking after affairs brought to his attention. Chief Clark

The Chief Clark took the stand and gave evidence as to the giving of instructions to officers. Continuing, witness said he had never been asked by Com. McLellan

To attend a meeting to talk over police matters. Between three and six months after the election of the commissioners he asked permission to appear before a committee in the morning to discuss police matters. When he went down Com. McLellan came out and said: "You can go in and talk to them, but I won't stay." I said, "Why, you're the man I want to talk with?" But Com. McLellan went off. I went in, but was quickly given to understand that every commissioner had full charge of his department.

Shortly after Com. McLellan took the Chief, though he submitted to him. He also wrote to him, but got no answer. In 1870 there were twenty-six men in the southern division and one in Carleton; now there are twenty-five men in the southern division and five in Carleton. Once Com. McLellan said the chief was making "a h-h" of a howl" about being men short.

The chief said in 1914 he did not receive a uniform, though he submitted his name along with others to Com. McLellan. He received uniforms in 1912 and 1913. Mr. Mullin-Wasn't it \$300? Com. McLellan-No such sum as \$200 was mentioned. The chief replied to the offer, that it was not a question of money, but of his good name. Continuing the chief told of his investigations into cases of Perry, Marshall, etc.

Mr. Mullin wanted to introduce letters from citizens written over twenty years ago voluntarily expressing appreciation of the chief's services; the crowd refused to admit them.

Richard McLeod.

Richard McLeod was on police force several years before 1912, when he was dismissed. He asked Com. McLellan to try to get him reinstated. Com. McLellan was not then sworn in, though he had been elected. Com. McLellan said it was no use for him to see the Chief, as the Chief was head-headed; Com. McLellan said he'd get the feathers off the Chief.

To Mr. Baxter witness said the chief asked him to resign because his feet had been getting bad. He saw Com. McLellan twice; the second time the Commissioner was too busy to talk to him. He did not have a promise that he would be put on the force again. Chief Clark recalled. To Mr. Baxter he said he was 72 years of age, sound in mind, limb, muscle and mind. He read to men from the criminal code, when an arrest could be made without warrant, etc. Q-Do you know if section one of the police manual is being violated? Q-Do you know if one of your officers is now in the employ of the light-house department? A-I have heard something; I have been investigating.
