

GREEKS TRIM WOODSTOCK; HOULTON BEATS CAPITALS

MARATHONS 11; WOODSTOCK 7

The first big league game of ball in this city since Tuesday the 6th inst., took place on the Marathon grounds yesterday afternoon when the Marathons defeated Woodstock by a score of eleven to seven. It was a game that had some loose play in it, and while there were in all 15 errors there were many sensational catches made, and some clever fielding.

Fred McGovern, the Greeks catcher, was injured by being hit by a bad bounding ball in the first inning and was forced to leave the game.

The fans had a chance to see O'Connor, the new man, pitch for the Marathons, and they saw a new Woodstock importation, worked for his team. Both men seemed to have a day off, and while they did not show up in their real form, they showed that they are capable of doing better work, and may be expected to be seen to better advantage at a later date.

The Greeks scored only in three innings. Their first run was made in the first inning, O'Brien going to right, second and third on errors, and scoring on a sacrifice fly. In the third inning four hits, two bases on balls, two errors, a wild pitch and a passed ball gave the Greeks six runs.

They did not score again until the seventh inning when with two out, two singles, a double, a man hit by a pitched ball, and two errors gave them four more runs.

Duff, the visiting first baseman, played for four innings with a very sore hand and was forced to retire from the game.

Woodstock made two runs in the first inning, two hits, a base on balls, and an error being responsible. The visitors scored another run in the second, a single, a sacrifice and an error doing the trick.

A single and two errors gave them another run.

They made three runs in the fifth inning, two singles, a stolen base and two errors being responsible. They failed to score in the next four innings.

The following is an account of the game by innings:

FIRST INNING.
Black hit safe to right for a base. A. had then O'Connor allowed Black to reach second. Williams drew a base on balls. Duff sacrificed to pitcher. O'Donnell hit to pitcher who threw to third but failed to catch Black and the bases were filled. Stone hit a hot grounder past third to left field scoring Black and Williams. The ball was thrown home and bounding near the plate struck McGovern over the eye cutting his face and rendering him unconscious. The game was called for a time and McGovern was obliged to retire to the place behind the bat being taken by Doc White. O'Donnell tried to squeeze home, but a batted ball by Perley hit him and he was out. Stone was caught off third and retired the side.

O'Brien hit to O'Donnell at second who muffed. Later the ball was thrown to Duff at first who missed. The runner when O'Donnell struck his hand up and knocked the ball away. O'Brien going to third on the error. Frayor struck out. Centre field. Riley threw to centre and O'Brien scored. Pinkerton struck out.

SECOND INNING.
Lamorey beat out a hunt to pitcher. Delano sacrificed to pitcher. Hanley fouled out to O'Brien at third. Black hit a hot one to Dutton who missed and Lamorey scored. Williams died out to Fraser in left field.

Dutton went out pitcher to first on a very close decision. O'Keefe fouled out to catcher. White died out to right.

THIRD INNING.
Duff went out, short to first. O'Donnell struck to left. Stone hit to pitcher and O'Connor threw badly to second, the ball going to centre field. Riley threw to third and O'Donnell scored while Stone went to third. Perley died out to left and Lamorey died out to centre.

Riley hit a hot one to Duff at first who muffed. O'Connor drew a base on balls. Riley started to steal third and a bad throw by Duff allowed Riley to score. O'Brien hit safe to centre and O'Connor scored. Frayor beat out a hit in front of plate. O'Brien going to third. Fraser got his base on balls and filled the bases. Pinkerton hit safe to centre, scoring O'Brien and Frayor. Dutton hit to pitcher who held the ball too long and the bases were filled again. A wild pitch allowed Fraser to score. A base ball allowed Pinkerton to score. White hit to O'Donnell and Dutton was forced out at the plate. Riley struck out and White was caught out trying to steal second. Score, Woodstock 4, Marathons 7.

FOURTH INNING.
Delano died out to left. Hanley went out, second to first. Black hit safe to right. Williams drew a base on balls. Frayor died out to right. O'Connor struck out. O'Brien drew a base on balls. Frayor died out to right field. O'Brien was put out trying to steal second.

FIFTH INNING.
O'Donnell fouled out to catcher. Stone singled to left field. Perley hit to first. O'Brien beat out a hit along third base line and stole second. Delano hit to O'Brien who muffed allowing Lamorey and Delano to score and tie the score. Black hit to Dutton at first. Fraser hit out to O'Donnell at second who made a nice one hand catch. Pinkerton died out to left. Duff hit out to first.

SIXTH INNING.
Williams died out to O'Brien. White singled to right and O'Donnell went to third. Perley hit to first. O'Keefe died out to right. White struck out. Riley to Delano in right who muffed. Riley was later thrown out trying to steal second. Score, Woodstock 7, Marathons 11.

SEVENTH INNING.
Lamorey died out to right. Delano hit safe to left. Hanley fouled out to O'Brien at third. Williams struck out. O'Connor went out to first. O'Brien struck out. Frayor hit safe to right. Frayor single to short. Pinkerton was hit with a pitched ball. Dutton hit to left for two bases scoring Frayor and Fraser. O'Keefe hit to O'Brien who muffed. Stone threw high to second in an endeavor to catch O'Keefe and Dutton scored. White struck out.

EIGHTH INNING.
Whitney died out to Riley in centre. O'Donnell died out to Frayor in right field. Stone struck out. White died out to centre. O'Connor hit safe to first. O'Brien struck to left. Frayor died out to Delano in right who muffed. Fraser struck out. Pinkerton hit to pitcher and O'Connor was forced out at the plate.

NINTH INNING.
Perley singled to left. Lamorey singled to centre. Delano died out to Riley in centre. Hanley hit to O'Keefe. O'Brien hit to pitcher who threw to third but failed to catch Black and the bases were filled. Stone hit a hot grounder past third to left field scoring Black and Williams. Despite the fact that the local team has been at the foot of the league since its inception they are not so far behind at this as Houlton and Fredericton are fairly closely bunched, and the third position is not so many points behind. There is still time for the Greeks to land pennant honors, and if they play the ball they are capable of they will do it.

It is likely that Steve White will be the box choice for the Greeks this afternoon, and the line up of the remainder of the team will be as yesterday, with the exception that George Wilner will be back in his position on the bench. The Woodstock team will present its strongest line-up and will make every effort to win as the result of the game will decide which of the two teams will get into third position.

Umpire Duffy will be here to umpire the game, and it is believed this arrangement will be as usual as heralded by the flag on the Marathon square. Two of the most important games in the whole summer's schedule will be played on Monday morning and afternoon, when the Marathons will clash with the league leaders. The Greeks are going better now than at any time this season, and it is possible that they may be able to win the Eastern Canada title. The probability is that O'Connor will pitch in the morning game on Monday with George Wilner in the afternoon.

On Tuesday the Marathons will visit Fredericton to play a double header. Whicker and White will be the battery workers on that occasion.

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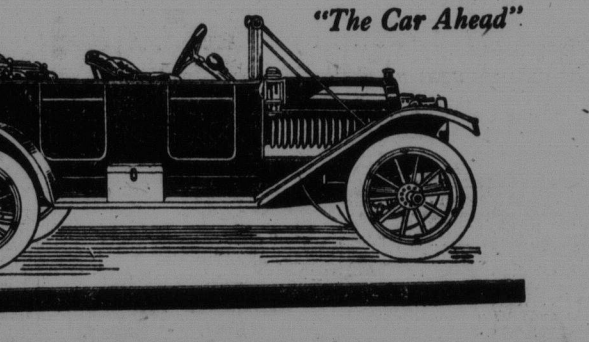
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
