**WILL CONSERVE  
RESOURCES OF  
THE PROVINCE**New Brunswick Government  
Makes Good Progress in  
Search for Best Farming  
Lands—to Protect Forests

Special to The Standard.  
Fredericton, Oct. 20.—Such good progress has been made in the New Brunswick forest survey under P. Z. Cochrane, provincial forester, that 20,000 acres have been covered to date and some of the maps are practically complete.

The object of this survey is not only to estimate the timber resources of the province but to learn the location of pure forest growing land and soil fit for field crops so that future settlement can be wisely guided.

Nearly all the provinces have shown tragic results of indiscriminate placing of settlers, and abandoned farms by the thousand testify to the evil consequence of allowing farmers to take up homesteads where the soil does everything except tree life.

Premier Clarke has ordered a soil type map of the province to be made of the whole forest area and this will be of the highest value in deciding what lands to open for settlement. The question of better fire protection in timbered areas is another urgent problem engaging the provincial government's attention.

**PORTLAND CHURCH RALLY ENDS.**


