arge Audience in Imperial Yesterday Hear Interesting Addresses on Missionary Movement - Converted Chinese Told of Need in China.

A good sized audience gathered at the Imperial theatre yesterday afternoon to listen to a message of the need of Christian missions and a call

need of Christian missions and a cail to greater effort on the part of all Christians to meet that need. Samuel Wong, a converted Chinese told of the need in China and of his conception of the responsibilities resting on the British people to supply the remedy. F. W. Burnham told more particularly of the work of the Disciples of Christ and of the latest movement among them known as the "Men and Millia, and Movement."

S. B. Culp, pastor of the Coburg street church presided, and had on the platform with him a number of ministers of other denominations as well as the speakers. He first called on A. McLean, who had charge of the foreign mission work of the demomination, but Mr. McLean said he was not going to give an address but only intended to introduce to the audience Samuel Wong who would address them.

Mr. Wong who was born in Canton,

Mr. Wong who was born in Canton, China, when a very young man went to Australia and is now in business in Melbourse. He has prospered in business tad his errand to America is to get a ship built for his firm.

In opening his address Mr. Wong said he wished to state that the credit for what he was today belonged to the missionaries of the Disciples of Carist church, who had come to Australia and labored among his people. He based his remarks on the words of Paul, "For I am debtor both to the Greeks and Barbarians, to the wise and unwise." He said he wished to apply these words to we British people, for he felt that he could class himself with the British nation, and the Chinese. The British people were debtor to the Chinese in three ways, politically, commercially and religiously.

Politically the British owed the Chinese a debt, and he was glad to be able to state that at last the British government had decided to construct with the Chinese to stamp out on the construction of the country, and now that the British had decided to help in supressing it he hoped it would not blong before it was wiped out.
