Refuse Passports To German Dyers

Berlin Government Refuses
to Allow Chemical Experts
to Leave Country.

Berlin, Jan. 20.—The German gov-
ernment has refused passports to a
number of chemical experts attached
to the Leverkusen works of the Ger-
man dyestuffs trust, on the ground
they proposed to go to the United
States to accept employment in Am-
erican dye factories. The chemists al-
ready had received foreign passports
when the news of their reported des-
tination started agitation against the
"betrayal of German trade secrets" to
American competitors, their pas-
ports then were cancelled.

The same procedure was employed
at least once before to prevent Ger-
man experts from placing specialized
knowledge at the disposal of Ameri-
can plants, but a number of experts
succeeded in getting by the German
barriers. American passport authori-
ties take the stand that their entry
to the United States should be per-
mitted when it is to the direct advan-
tage of American business. German
engineers and technicians repeatedly
have been permitted to accept posi-
tions in the United States.

FORBIDDEN TO PLAY, BOY HANGS HIMSELF

Leominster, Mass., Jan. 20.—Curtail-
ment of his recreation and the effect
upon his unhappy mind of the sight of
a rope dangling from a beam were ad-
vanced today as possible explanations
of the suicide of Oliver Carter Chaney,
a high school boy of 16 years, whose
body was found yesterday hanging in
the attic of a deserted farmhouse.

The boy disappeared Saturday after-
noon, after telling his mother he was
going to look for a rope with which to
fix a double runner sled. Frantic search
followed his failure to return home at
supper time, but it was not until the
next day that his father, George C.
Chaney, discovered the body suspended
from a beam in the abandoned
dwelling only 150 feet from his own
dooryard.

To the Medical Examiner, Dr. Geo.
P. Norton of Fitchburg, Mr. Chaney
expressed the belief that the boy's act
was induced by the psychological ef-
