The regulations of the Academy are not therefore to be regarded as simply necessary to secure order, that the teachers and students may perform their work successfully, but they exist to cultivate correct views of the relations of the governing to the governed, correct habits, and the power of proper self-government.

Classification

At the opening of each Term an effort is made to classify the pupils to the best advantage.

The daily marks are combined with the results of frequent written and oral examinations, and the scholarship is thus determined.

Unexcused absences from class are reckoned as failures.

There are three grades of scholarship : —

FIRST GRADE—Those whose average is from 6.5 to 10.

SECOND GRADE— “ “ “ 4.5 to 6.5.

THIRD GRADE— “ “ below 4.5.

Students of the Junior Year, who on the year's work have obtained First Grade, are allowed to advance to the Middle Year ; those of the Second Grade are allowed to join the Middle Year on probation for one term, and in case they do not improve their standing they are put back into the new Junior Class. Students of the Third Grade are required to go over the Year's work again. The same principle is applied in the case of students of the Middle Year being advanced to the Senior Year.

First Grade students of the Senior Year from Horton Collegiate Academy are admitted to the College as full matriculants, without examination, on presentation of a matriculation diploma signed by the Principal of the Academy. A diploma granted is based upon the marks earned during the student's total attendance at the Academy.
