A BAILWAY PROM ENGLAND TO FRANCE bly remained untested for two reasons—first the great cost; second, the interruption which such designs would cause to the navigation of the English Channel. Mr. James Chalmers, who has devoted much study to this question, claims to have designed a plan which does not admit either of the objections referred to. His project is to construct a strong iron tube reaching from shore to shore sud containing a double line of rails capable of carrying all ordinary trains at the usual speed. The tube would be supported by its own buoyaney, kept down by anchors or boxes filled with rough stones both boxes and tubes being covered by an embarkment, which in a few years would, by the action of the tide and moving silt, be converted into a solid mass, thus protectby the action of the tide and moving silt, be converted into a solid mass, thus protecting the tube from all injury. The tube would pass through three ventilators, one in mid channel and one about a mile from either shore. The details of the project are minutely explained by Mr. Chalmers in a small volumn which he has published. The large ventilator in mid channel would, it is argued, by being converted into a lighthouse, assist rather than impede mariners in beating up or down channel, and the estimated cost is only £12,000,000, calculating the iron work at £25 per ton—a very fair estimate. An expenditure of £12,000,000 for constructing a railway 20 miles in length certainly does at first appear to be an excessive amount: but the estimated cost of the work as designed by several eminent ensured.

Comprising every Color, Style, Quality and work as designed by several eminent engineers would have reached sums varying from £15,000,000 to £87,000,000. The scheme of Mr. Chalmers is therefore, one of the cheapest which has been proposed.
