

Guelph Man Upsets Canoe and Drowns

GUELPH, June 2.—A.B. Benzie, an attendant at the Homewood Sanatorium, was drowned in the Speed River this afternoon, after falling out of a canoe in which he and another attendant from the sanatorium, W. Wilson, had been boating for two hours previous. Benzie's body was located about half an hour later by Chief Smith of the Fire Department, and Constable Fred Morrison. The motor was used in the unfortunate man to some time, but every effort to resuscitate him proved of no avail.
The two men, who are on night duty at the Homewood, this morning hired a canoe for a trip up the river. After paddling around for a couple of hours and when opposite the pipe mills Benzie requested Wilson to change seats, and at once arose and started walking in the canoe. The result was that the boat was upset and the two found themselves in the water.
Benzie was unable to swim, and immediately grasped hold of Wilson and took him down. When they arose Wilson managed to free himself, then, striking for the bank he soon had his clothes off and jumped back in the water. He made several attempts to locate his companion, but without success, and, yelling for some boys who were swimming near by, he asked them to continue diving while he sent in an alarm.
Disagreeing over a ton of hay, Duncan Brown is alleged to have shot his brother, William, at Sydney. No permit will be issued by the Governor-General for the operation of the milk condensers on Sunday in London. Shepard, Branford, reputed to be one of the best swimmers, was drowned in the Grand river.
