

A VERDICT BY THE JURY IS EXPECTED BY

Evidence All in At 12.35 p.m. To-day. Petcoff
Agrees With Story at First Trial, Although Diff
Details.

NEW WITNESSES CALLED FOR DEF

The evidence for the defense is being heard in the murder trial of AF 530 Petcoff yesterday afternoon. All the Crown witnesses had been examined and cross-examined. Another hour was put in by the Court and jury receiving the evidence of several defense witnesses and adjournment was made until 10.15 o'clock this morning.

One of the two accused men, Boyeff, a Crown witness in the case of the charge against Petcoff, took the stand shortly after two o'clock and for nearly three hours was subject to a severe examination and cross-examination. His story about the affair coincided in the main with his former story. He again denied getting money off the body of Sobelkoff.

As only money he saw was that in a purse taken by Petcoff.

The defense counsel devoted a considerable part of his cross-examination to ascertaining where Boyeff got the \$1240, he had on his person. Boyeff claimed he had been carrying this for nine or ten months. He said that he had cashed a cheque in the Bank of Montreal, Stratford nine months before, for \$500 which was signed by the Stratford postmaster for Christo Petcoff of Niagara Falls for a partnership in his cheese business. He did not know whether this man was a relative of Ivan Petcoff.

The witness further during the course of the cross-examination said two days after the alleged murder he paid \$100 in cash to an agent in Brantford for life insurance, which he was told would cost him \$58 to \$60 a year. He wanted to pay in advance.

He again admitted having told different stories after the alleged murder, but when pressed as to whether he didn't want to make it worse for Petcoff he denied that he had any such intention but his actions were simply the result of his excitement.

As to the watch in the Court which was found on Petcoff, the witness thought Petcoff's watch was bigger than this, and was plain and not engraved.

Chief Gorman, of Galt, again submitted his evidence and he was the last Crown witness.



TESTS PROVE SMALLPOX REAL—NOT CHICKENPOX

(Special to Record.)

TORONTO, Nov. 18.—No doubt exists in the minds of Toronto's health authorities that the present epidemic is smallpox and not chickenpox, as many people still seem to believe. About a month ago many of the present cases of smallpox were diagnosed as chickenpox and later were declared to be smallpox.

The difference between the two in the early stages is very slight. Scientific tests have recently been made upon the lower animals (it is unlawful to make tests of human beings) and the results prove conclusively that it is smallpox that is prevalent in the city today.

To prove beyond doubt that these small cases were smallpox, the health authorities took the contents of a vial of a doubtful case and injected it into the shaved skin of rabbits which had previously been vaccinated against smallpox. Twelve days being required to produce immunity in a rabbit by vaccination this period was allowed to elapse before the test was made. The result showed an average redness at the site of injection. This is taken as proof that the material taken from the vesicle of the doubtful case was smallpox virus.

MAY NOT WAIT FOR U.S. SANCTION OF THE PEACE TREATY

LONDON, Nov. 18.—Great Britain and France are considering whether they are not compelled to proceed with the carrying out of the German peace treaty and the operation of the League of Nations independently of the United States, pending the decision of American government on its course. It is pointed out that matters are continually arising under the treaty which need immediate attention, such as the operation of various plebiscite commissions and it is considered that because of this fact it is no longer possible to delay making past operative.
