THE WEEKLY MARKET
The crowd at the weekly market this morning was larger than usual and while there was a good supply of farm and garden produce offered it all found a ready sale. As was to be expected butter and eggs were higher than a week ago the former selling at 54 to 55 cents per lb while eggs brought from 40 cents to 42 cents per dozen. While the demand was large the supply held out remarkably well although there was much dissatisfaction expressed at the raise in price. The farmers expressed the opinion it would be still higher next Saturday which accounted for the fact that householders stocked up as much as possible.

BOARD OF TRADE PASS RESOLUTION

Favor Sunday Cars
The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trade was held last night when the only business of importance passed was the passing of a resolution strongly favoring the running of Sunday cars on the Grand River Railway. The members present were unanimous on this point and they will use their influence to have the service installed as speedily as possible. While the attendance of members was not as large as it should have been still there are enough active members to keep the Board alive. The membership we understand is something over 100 and while the small attendance at meetings is to be discouraged those who take an interest in the Board and its objects they intend to stick and keep the interest as much as possible. There is much for a Board of Trade to do and it is to be hoped more interest will be taken in the future than in the past.

Fiji Islands
The climate of the Fiji Islands is nothing like as hot as is generally thought. The islands, about 250 in all, lie about 1,900 miles northeast of Sydney, the more important rising abruptly sometimes to a height of 4,000 feet. The climate is cool for the tropics, the highest shade temperature at Suva (1899) being 93 in March, the lowest 61 degrees, in September. The rainfall is very heavy, being 130 inches in Suva. Dark and frizzly-haired, the Fijians are Melanesians, with a Polynesian strain in the east. The chief trade is with Australia, New Zealand, and the islands are a British possession. It was said that a generation ago the Fijians were cannibals and human sacrifices formed part of many of the religious ceremonies.

Rare Postage Stamps
The rarest English stamp curiosity is the pair of Mulready wrappers on India paper issued in 1840, which bring \$400. The V.R. black English penny stamp, which was in circulation for only a short time, is a great rarity. The New Brunswick five cents stamp, with the head of O'Connell, has brought \$150. The two Reunions stamps—the fifteen and thirty cents—are valued at \$500. The set of four Sandwich Islands, of 1852, is worth something like \$1,500.

Provincial Matter Says Railway Board

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT'S VIEW FOLLOWING RAILWAY BOARD'S FINDING
Ottawa April 11—Following a judgment handed down to-day by the railway board announcing that the board had no power to interfere with the adoption of daylight saving time by the railroads, Parliament this evening adopted summer time for the sittings of the House. Just before the House adjourned, Hon. Arthur Meighen, who was leading the Government, arose and stated that the effect of the judgment was that the setting of standard or local time was a matter for provincial jurisdiction. That being the case he suggested that the House when it adjourned to-night should meet again at 3 o'clock summer time on Monday.

The Decision.
Ottawa April 11—Daylight saving is a matter for Parliament and the board having no jurisdiction cannot pass upon the merits of the issue one way or the other" says Sir Henry

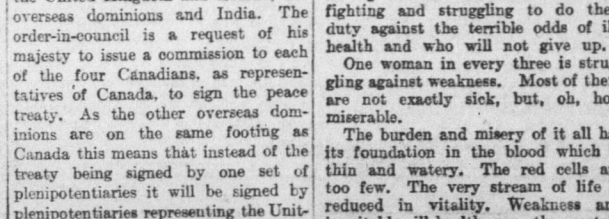

Canadian Delegates Will Sign the Treaty

TREATY MAY COME BEFORE CANADIAN PARLIAMENT IF NECESSARY AFTER SIGNATURE FOR RATIFICATION.
Ottawa April 11—An announcement by Hon. N.W. Rowell, president of the privy council in the Commons this afternoon that Sir Robert Borden, Sir George Foster, Hon. J.C. Doherty and Hon. Arthur Sifton have been appointed plenipotentiaries to sign the peace treaty on behalf of Canada at the conclusion of the peace conference marks a new step in the development of the status of Canada and the other overseas dominions.
The order-in-council which was enabled by the minister is the recognition of the status of the dominions at the peace conference. It is couched in the usual terms of orders-in-council naming plenipotentiaries on behalf of his majesty and gives ministers named "power and authority as from the first day of January 1919 to conclude with such plenipotentiaries as may be vested with similar powers and authority on the part of any powers or states any treaties, conventions or agreements in connection with the peace conference and to sign for and in the name of His Majesty the King in respect of the Dominion of Canada everything so agreed upon and conclude and to transact all such other matters as may appertain thereto."
King is Chief Party
The chief party to the signing of the peace agreement, it is explained, is His Majesty the King, representing the United Kingdom and Ireland, the overseas dominions and India. The order-in-council is a request of his majesty to issue a commission to each of the four Canadians, as representatives of Canada, to sign the peace treaty. As the other overseas dominions are on the same footing as Canada this means that instead of the treaty being signed by one set of plenipotentiaries it will be signed by plenipotentiaries representing the United Kingdom and each of the self-governing dominions of the empire.
This is the second distinct change in the status of the self-governing dominions in respect to the signing of treaties. At first treaties were signed by the representatives of the empire and were binding on the whole empire.
Must Give Consent
More recently, as the status of the overseas dominions has become more fully recognized, it has been provided that treaties should not apply to the dominions unless they indicated their assent thereto, and procedure was outlined whereby the dominions might indicate their assent. A comparatively recent instance was the assent given by Canada some years ago to the treaty between Great Britain and Japan.
Mr. McKenzie, leader of the Opposition, asked if the House would have an opportunity to consider the peace treaty before it was signed.

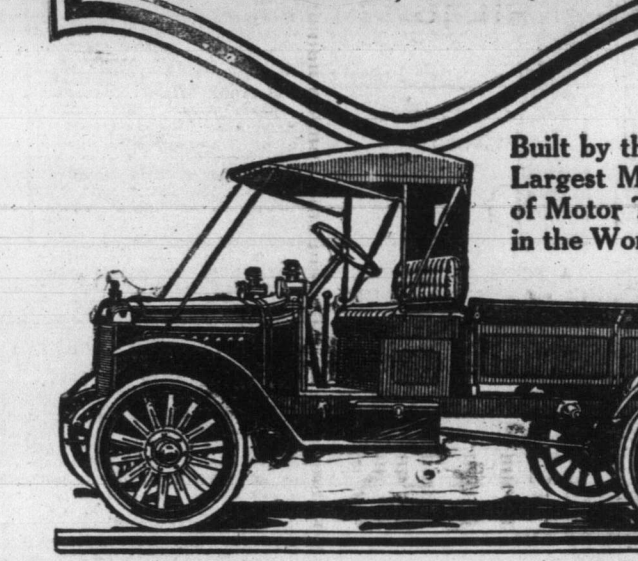

AIRPLANE LUMBER DEMAND CREATED HUGE INDUSTRY



Type of Magnificent Spruce which is being cut in British Columbia.
When the necessary readjustment following on the close of the war are completed, Vice-President and General Manager W. P. Hinton, of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, predicts that the lumbering industry in Central and Northern British Columbia and on the Queen Charlotte Islands will develop in truly wonderful fashion. The demand for airplane spruce led to the creation of a huge new industry in regions in British Columbia that were practically undeveloped. Very little exact information was available as to the extent of the spruce areas, but large sums of money have now been spent obtaining this valuable data. Scores of logging plants were placed in operation on the Queen Charlotte Islands where little lumbering had previously been done. A great system of water transportation was created to facilitate the towing of logs across the Hecate Straits to the mainland at Prince Rupert, B.C., where many mills have been erected to saw spruce exclusively. The co-ordination of logging and saw-milling has led to ever increasing monthly rail shipments by the Grand Trunk-Pacific out of Prince Rupert, these shipments, when the demand for airplane spruce was at its height, being double the entire British Columbia output of normal times. A new market for the magnificent spruce of British Columbia is now being developed by the creation at Prince Rupert of large shipbuilding plants for the construction of wooden and steel vessels.
