Death drop at U of A

by Umberto Galberini Tragedy has struck an Edmonton family for the second time, as Jack Badger fell twelve feet to his death Tuesday.

The fourth-year Commerce stu-The fourth-year Commerce stu-dent was approaching the west doors of the Business-Tory Annex when a portion of the concrete gave way. In April of 1985 Mr. Badger's brother, Geoff, died in a similarly grotesque manner only ten feet from where Jack Badger-died.

U of A Services Chief Al Cohol, who spoke on the condition that he not be identified, said that his department knew that such an accident was inevitable.

Friends of Mr. Badger say that the deceased was returning from a meeting with representatives of the Guiness Book of World Records. He had felt that his being refused for employment by 392 accounting firms was worthy of entry in the Guiness Book.


VPFinance Steve Twibble agreed,
