

and Caughnawaga; From the latter place, he was ordered to Fort George, where he placed himself under the command of Colonel Claus. On the 18th June, of the same year, he was, with a Picket under his command, engaged with a party of American Dragoons at four miles back, whom he repulsed, took 5 Prisoners and killed 6 private and an officer.

That on the 31<sup>st</sup> of the same month, he was in another engagement at Beaver Dam, having under his command a party of Indians, to the number of 285.

That he was then in company with Capt. Ducharme of Lake of Two mountains, and his party and that they then made 660 prisoners with Colonel Butler and a number of other officers 37 Dragoons took 2 field pieces and killed 104 of the enemy.

That on the 11<sup>th</sup> of August same year, he was engaged at Cross roads with his advanced picket then under the command of Major Jarvis when 12 of the enemy were found dead, on the field of battle.

That on the 11<sup>th</sup> September following, Your Excellency was at the Battle of Fort George or Cross Roads, where he had the misfortune to be taken prisoner, carried to Niagara, put in irons, thrown into a Dungeon, called the Cell, whose only flooring was the damp or rather muddy ground, in which dismal situation, he was kept during the space of a month.

That being at the expiration of that time, released from confinement, he was transferred to Green Bush, allowed to remain on Parole at Cheshire and Burlington during the space of 7 months, and for two
