the advantages of the direct method with those of the grammatical method.

The book is not primarily intended to serve as a reference grammar, but the addition of a copious index and the prominent type of the section headings will render it easy of consultation for this purpose.

The authors take this opportunity of expressing their thanks to a large number of teachers for advice and criticism in the preparation of the work, and in particular to Professors Saint-Elme de Champ and W. C. Ferguson, of the University of Toronto, for assistance in the revision of the manuscript and proofs.
