

CHATEAUGUAY AND ITS GARDEN CITY

Windsor Street Station by the New York Central, for Chateauguay, covering the distance in half an hour.

This service will, no doubt, be greatly augmented by the recent double-tracking of the C.P.R. and the enlarging of its bridge across the St. Lawrence River at Lachine.

Increased transportation facilities should also result from the extension, within a very short time, of the electric cars of the Southern Counties Railway which are already running as far as Chambly.

There are excellent beaches for bathing within less than five minutes' walk of the town, which are free to residents.

Besides its facilities for bathing, Lake St. Louis offers unusual advantages for sailing and motor-boating, rowing, canoeing, etc., as well as duck shooting.

Chateauguay has the reputation of being one of the finest spots on the Lake for fishing, and this is borne out by the fact that it supports a fishing village.

an hour after leaving your office or place of business, in a locality where your neighbors are congenial and where your surroundings are pleasant.

To add to the attractions of this delightful spot, there is a yachting and boating club, where regattas are held during the day, followed by dances in the evenings.

Chateauguay is within five miles of the new Kanawaki Golf Links which have recently been completed at an enormous outlay, constituting at the present time one of the finest links in Canada.

To accommodate those who do not care to purchase a home, in Chateauguay, but simply to reside there, a large hotel will be constructed early in 1914, which will easily house over one hundred guests.

Negotiations are now under way with the ecclesiastical authorities with a view to constructing a Roman Catholic Church, and there is no doubt that next year will see a new steeple in one of the finest locations of the town.

Thoroughly efficient schools both Protestant and Roman Catholic are already provided for.

As the automobile has become such a large factor in modern locomotion, steps are now being taken to improve the roads in and around the town of Chateauguay, and strong influence has been brought to bear on the Government at Quebec to have the roads between Montreal and Chateauguay made passable for automobile traffic.

However, while the above improvements are under way, other means will be at the disposal of automobile owners to enable them to reach Chateauguay without having to drive over rough roads.

Next summer a ferry will cross from Lachine to Caughnawaga which will be fully equipped to transport automobiles from Montreal to Chateauguay affording good roads all the way. At the present time the town is lighted by electricity.

Next summer it is the intention of the town council to lay sidewalks, install running water and equip the municipality with a sewerage system, and the Provincial Government will construct a vehicular bridge across the Chateauguay River.

We may mention here that Chateauguay will soon have beautiful drives over smooth, level, shady roads, and is noted for its fine old homes. It is likewise situated within a few hundred yards of Wood-
