International Bible Lesson for To-Morrow-Jesus calls four disciples— Luke v., 1-11,

Golden Text—"If ye continue in My word then are ye My disciples in-deed."

Immediately after His rejection at Nazereth, we find Jesus making his headquarters at Capernaum, and separated, apparently from His own kindred, boarding with Peter. He seems to have made many friends in this city, and wrought many miracles, yet He fortells it shall be cast down to hell, though exalted to heaven with privileges.

See John 21, 3,—"Peter saith unto them, I go a-fishing." He evidently had faith in his skill as a fisherman up to the last. Jesus knew it, and he must be taught to trust the Christ for his every need. "Twas just as as easy for our Lord to fill the nets during the night as the day, but Peter's faith did not realize that every fish in the sea was under our Lord's control, as are all things, and he had to learn it by Jesus' practical lessons. You know how to preach, we know how to fish, "nevertheless at Thy word I will let down the nets." Was it any wonder Peter fell at His knees and cried "depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord." Sinful because doubtful.

Jesus was Lord of the fish also. But Jesus said unto Smon Simon, "Fear not, for thou shalt catch men,

Fear not, for thou shalt catch men, as thou hast caught fish by obeying me and my word; follow me." And they did. Go thou and do likewise!
