HARRISBURG.

A village situated on Fairchild's Creek, and on lot number one, first concession township of South Dumfries, and at the junction of the Great Western and Guelph line Railways. The town plot originally belonged to Mr. A. N. Vrooman, and was laid out about the year 1855. A store, and tavern were built a few years previous, the former by Wm. Todd, and the latter by Adam Misener. The post office was established in 1854, Alex. Dunbar, first P. M. There is a New Connection church in the village.
