Mr. Major Theakston proposed a vote of thanks to

Subscribers and donors for their benefactions; To the Religious Tr ct Society; the Scotch National Bible Society; the Stirling Tract Society, for specially favourable terms; to the Allan Steamship Company, for facilities of transport; and to the public press for the willing aid it renders in keeping the work of the Society before the public.

He became a tract distributer forty years ago, in Drury Lane, London; and he has been at it, more or less, ever since. This Society has bountifully supplied him for many years. He gave instances of good results, which had come under his own notice, from tract reading. He is now engaged among the seamen, and finds the indispensable need of bountiful supplies of tracts; and these are freely received from the Depository.

Seconded by Mr. Blackwood. The Society, he said, keeps out of debt, and this is one secret of its success. Were it not for the work of this Society, there are portions of the Maritime Provinces which would be in absolute darkness. Passed unanimously.
