After that period, all Letters dropped into the Letter Box, wholly suppaid, or publicas than a single rate o Postage, will be detained and returned to the writer.

Letters on Service addressed to any of the Imperial Public Departments posted in Nova Scotia, will be excempted from the regulation requiring prepayment.
