posses of the donors diverted from the humane and pious purposes of the donors the Kings and Subjects of *France*; have been, fince the conquest, abforbed by the Reverend Fathers in *Canada* for their personal support; or have been by them distributed in alms and other benevolent charities.

That by the late demife of the Reverend Father Cafot, the last of the Order in this Province, the estates and possessions of the Society of Jefuits are now indubitably vested in His Majesty, and at his royal disposition and will.

That therefore, his dutiful and faithful Canadian fubjects most humbly beleech His Majesty to appropriate the faid Estates, if not already disposed of, to the purpose of Education in this his Province of Lower-Canada, in such manner as to His Majesty in his Royal Wisdom may seem meet! Or if already disposed of by His Majesty, that he may be graciously pleased to grant and assign some other estate, or portion of the waste lands of the Crown, or other such with Royal foundation, for the purposes of learning and science, as his Royal munificence may direct.

That it is the humble opinion of the Reprefentatives of the Commons of Canada in the prefent Parliament allembled, that the enlightening of the minds of the youth of the Province by liberal education, is the fureft means of attaining the ends of that free and generous conflitution which His Majefty in Parliament has fo gracioufly been pleafed to beftow upon his Canadian people. That the more his fubjects here, are enabled to perceive the benefits arifing from the ineftimable boon conferred, the more they will admire and be attached to that wife and incomparable fyftem of civil and political order and freedom which the nations of the world envy, in the kingdoms and countries living under His Majefty's dominion. That happy combination of government, which, as avowed by a confpicuous modern reformer, enables His Majefty, our gracious fovereign, to " seign over a free nation " with the fole view of making it happy."
