Aunt Susan and her friends will visit Bethel, three miles north of Stirling, on Friday night, the 22nd. Let's go. Says King Manuel of Portugal, Now in England, in a letter to Portuguese Monarchists. LISBON, Oct. 19.—Portuguese monarchists have been notified that the former King Manuel of Portugal, who is now in England is opposed at present to any steps toward restoration of the monarchy in this country. This is made public in a letter to the Young Conservative Monarchists issued by Councillor Agnes d'Ornelas, who is official representative here of the exiled king. The letter was written in a hospital where the royalist statesman is recovering from an operation under surveillance until he can be returned to prison where he has been for nearly two years since the last monarchist uprising. The Councillor says that he believes former King Manuel regards the economic distress now prevalent in Portugal "to forbid all genuine Portuguese from taking part in any kind of revolutionary movement." The Councillor advises the Young Monarchists, instead, to support social order which he says is now at stake in so many ways. He adds: "We must maintain our national integrity afterward we will see to the political form of government under which it is to live." In the meantime he suggests that the monarchists take legal steps to organize their forces. This letter was evidently written in answer to questions addressed to Councillor d'Ornelas as the royalist leader in Portugal, because a group of monarchists who have abandoned their allegiance to the former King Manuel are undertaking to select as pretender to the throne a young scion of another branch of the House of Braganza. This group sent a delegation to Duke Michel de Braganza, head of the Austrian branch of the family, asking permission to name his youngest son, Prince Nuno Duarte, as heir to the throne of Portugal if a monarchy should be restored. Prince Nuno Duarte is only 13 years old. The choice fell upon him because Prince Miguel, the eldest son of Duke Michel is held to be debarred from royal rights because he married Anita Stewart, an American woman, and because the Duke's second son was killed in the war while fighting with the Austrian army. Owing to the youth of Prince Nuno this monarchist group proposes to name his aunt, the Princess Adelaide de Braganza Bourbon, Countess de Bardi, widow of Prince Henry de Bourbon de Parma, as regent until she shall become of age. The group of monarchists undertaking these steps call themselves the Integralists party. The newspaper Secula says in an interview with a member of that party that it is probable the old royalist party called the Miguelistas will join forces with this new party against the followers of the former King Manuel.
