COMFORTABLE CATTLE CHAIN. The method now in vogue of fastening cattle is quite common in the barns of dairymen where wooden or iron stanchions are not in use. It is doubtful if a more satisfactory, cheaper or humane method of cattle fastening can be provided. For the neck and throat a strap with a light ring permanently attached is worn continuously. A light chain 3 feet long has a ring at one end which slides freely on a round stanchion of smooth hardwood about 3 inches in diameter.
