### THE STRAWBERRY.

Horriculturists Listen to an Interesting Address on it.

It Costs he More to thew Good Fruit Than Poor Stuff - A ell Attunded Atceting

The lectures given in Christ Church Sunday school last night under the auspices of the Horticultural society, were highly instructive and were listened to by a large audience. The hall was prettily decorated. The alcove above the speakers was hung with glorious Union Jacks. In front of the platform were arranged beautiful foliage and palm plants from the city green houses. The plants were the property of T. A. Smith, Chas. Baxter, and McKenzie Ross & Sons. Pres.dent Gordon Boles, Secy-Treasurer Geot Massey and the two speakers of the evening were on the platform. Capt. Boles, who occupied the chair, opened the meeting with a splendid narration of the work, purpose and success of the Chatham Horticultural society. He then introduced E. B. Stevenson, of Port Rowan, the first speaker. His subject was THE STRAWBERRY.

After a history of the berry, Mr. Stevenson stated that the different species of strawberries were distinguished as the wild, the Alpine, the Chilian and the native American. The Chilian was the best of these, and the origin of the garden berries of Ontario was a pross between the Chilian and origin of the garden berries of Ontario was a cross between the Chaian and the Native American. There were a large number of new varieties of these four primary kinds and new ones were being produced every year, but these were obtained by crossing. He characterized as rubbish a great many of the bearles now on the market. It took no more time for the cultivation of the good kinds and the large varieties than it did to grow the small berties than it did to grow the small berries. As an instance, the case of two ries. As an instance, the case of two growers near Hamilton was pointed out. One invested \$10 in new plants and sold his yield at 11 cents a box. The other who had not purchased new plants, but had used plants obtained from stock grown on his farm for years, sold his berries for a cent and a half a box. It is better to eat fruit in the fruit season, as it is healthy and much more beneficial fresh than cooked. than cooked.

Profits accrue from a field of ber Profits accrue from a field of berries according to the manure, muscle and brain utilized in their production. The average returns are from \$200 to \$300 per acre, but five, six, seven and eight hundred dollars per acre have been realized by some men. There are a hundred varieties of berries, but only a few do well on all soils. The producer must find out what kind will do best on his own ground.
