PATERSON'S MURDER CASE.

Knock-out Drops Shown to Have Caused Death.

Rapid Progress of the Trisl-The Prosecution May Not Need Any Evidence From the Fourth

Man Accused.

Paterson, N. J. Jan. 16.-At the Bosschieter trial yesterday the court zeem was crowded, and many persons were unable to gain admission. Alister, Campbell and Death look pale and haggard. The rapid progress mude Monday in the case has somewhat surprised leading members of the bar. There is still considerable speculation as to whether Kerr, who reses jointly indicted with the other prisoners, but who was granted a separate trial, will be called as a witness for the state. The prosecutor and the lawyers for the defense refused to say

anything on the subject. Dr. Andrew F. McBride testified that, in making an autopsy on the body, he had concluded that the girl's death had resulted from the administration of poison and he thought that the poison used had been chloral hy-

Prof. Rudolph S. Witthaus, of New York, said he had been investigating toxicology for twenty-five years and had written books on the subject. He had received a bottle containing three drops of a yellowish liquid, which on analysis proved to be a solution of chloral hydrate amounting to two and a half grains. This was the botthe found near the spot where the body of the murdered girl was discovered. The witness also said that he had received on October 29, from Dr. M. Reide. he had received on October 29. from Dr. M. Bride, a small jar containing the stomach and kidneys of the dead girl. He had analyzed the stomach and had found in it five grains of chloral hydrate. This was similar to the liquid he had found in the little hottle. Pritt Witthaus was cross-examined by former Judge Hoffman. In answer to the latter's questions he said that the five grains found in the girl's stomach would not have caused death, but there had been indications that there had been a much larger quantity in the stomach at least ten times as much. He thought he was safe in saying that the drug had caused buth.

Other physicians testified that they believed Miss Bosschieter's death was caused by chloral hydrate. Detectives and policemen told of incriminating statements made by Death at the time of his arrest. Mr. Emley then submitted the case as complete. Pritt Witthaus was cross-examined
