PORT ARTHUR BLOCKADE.

oge Reports Main Strongth of Russian Completely Crushed and Work of Jap Fleet Practically Over.

Tokio, Dec. 26.—Admiral Togo telegraphing under date of Dec. 22,

says:
"After 203-Metre Hill was occupied "After 203-Metre Hill was occupied as a result of a gallant and desperate attack by the besieging army the bombardment of the enemy's squadron by a siege and other heavy guns became effective. In consequence the battleships Poltava and Retvizan were sunk and subsequently the batwere sunk and subsequently the bat tleships Pobieda and Pereviet, the tleships Pobleda and Pereviet, the protected cruiser Pallada and the armored cruiser Bayen were sunk. The battleship Sevastopol escaped the land bombardment, left the harbor, Dec. 9, and anchored near Chentao Mountain. She was attacked there continuously by our torpedo boats and heavily damaged. The main strength of the enemy is completely crushed. Only a weak gunboat, the Otvashai, and several torpedo boat destroyers remain afloat. Under the circumstances our combined fieet has been removed as unne-Under the circumstances our combin-ed fleet has been removed as unne-cessary from the blockade of Port Arthur, which has been maintained since May 1. I have arranged for a closer watch for ships attempting to run the blockade, and then watch the remnant of the enemy's squadron.

Mines Were Damazing. "During the blockade we suffered from the enemy's mines, both laid and floating on the high seas, and from dense fogs. The Miyako, Yoshino, Hatsuse, Kaimon, Helyen and Saiyen were sunk, and many gallant and loyal officers and men were killed, but we succeeded in maintaining the blockade. When the enemy emerged from the harbor our feet successed ed from the harbor our fiest successfully engaged them and finally with the valuable support of the besieging army succeeded in crushing nearly all

the enemy's squadron.
"Our second squadron so heavily
damaged the Vladivostock squadron
that it has been unable to leave

Where Credit Is Due.

"All this success is gratefully attributed to the brilliant virtue of our Emperor. During the blockade all the ships under my command splendidly accomplished the work, and duty assigned to them. Especially to be noted are some of those who were engaged in the difficult and risky task of blockading or who tirelessly accomplished the work of laying mines in the presence of the enemy, others who, braving all dangers, were engaged in the work of enemy, others who, having agers, were engaged in the work of clearing mines away, and others still who were posted to watch the enemy and guard against the enemy's ships, their combined works strongly contributed to the accomplishment of the blockade. I deem it my duty to especially mention my recognition of the valuable services rendered by the officers and men.

Mebilization Causes Disorders. St. Perersburg, Dec. 27.-While the st. Perersburg, Dec. 27.—While the new mobolization is proceeding quietly in most places, disorders are reported to have occurred in Poland. The most serious disturbance was at Razon yesterday, where one colonel was killed and a gendarme wounded. There has also been considerable riotage at Bekhoug, where 6.000 coning at Bakhoug, where 6,000 con-scripts pillaged a few houses and fruit stalls. No one, however, was

Mukden, Dec. 27.-Volunteers who crossed the Shakhe River on Friday, surprised a force of the enemy, killing about 100 and taking 15 prisoners. The Russian losses were trifling. Sails For Pert Arthur.

Yokohama, Dec. 27.—The steamer manchu, bound for the neighborhood of Port Arthur, left here yesterday. She carried as passengers ten naval attaches, four peers, seventeen mem-bers of the House of Representatives, one Secretary of the Diet, and a lieutenant-commander. There will be no press representative on board dur-ing the voyage, which it is expected will occupy three weeks.

MUST PROVE CHADWICK IN ONIO. Sheriff Refused Requisition Papers By

Albany, N.Y., Dec. 27.—Sheriff Barry of Cuyahoga County, Ohio, who expects to arrest Dr. LeRoy S. Chadwick, husband of Mrs. Chadwick, when he lands in New York to-day, when he lands in New York to-day, on the charge of forging the name of Andrew Carnegie, met a check in his plans yesterday when he failed to obtain from Gov. Odell the requisition papers necessary to permit the transportation of Dr. Chadwick to Ohio for trial.

Ohio for trial. He called at the executive cham He called at the executive cham-bers in the capital yesterday morn-ing; but was informed by Judge John T. Boyce, the Governor's par-don and requisition clerk, that his papers were defective in that they failed to prove that Dr. Chadwick was in the State of Ohio on March 5, 1903, when the alleged forgery was committed

was committed Sheriff Barry decided not to try to correct his papers now, but to go on to New York and arrest Dr. Chad-wick and arrange for his requisition
