

The charge is the outcome of a children's quarrel. Burke's story is that on Sunday afternoon he visited his brother, who lives near Bird, taking his son Willie, aged 14, with

They returned to pick up two or three little girls. They met a young son of Bird's. It appears there had been some trouble between this lad and the Burke children previous. They had another altercation and young Bird came out second best. The Burke family continued their boat trib and young Bird second best. The Burke family con-tinued their boat trip and young Bird

tinued their boat trip and young Bird went home.

Bird and his son manned another boat and went in pursuit of the Burkes and caught up with them. Young Burke says there were some words exchanged, and that Bird climbed into their boat, grabbed him and threw him into the water. When he came to the surface Bird shoved him away from the boat, with an him away from the boat, with an him away from the boat with an him away from the boat with an oar so that he could not reach the boat. Then he threw the oars away and rowed off in his own boat. Young Burke cannot swim. He says he was almost drowned when his companion held one of the little girls over the side of the boat. She was able to reach an oar, which she held out to him so that he grasped it.

The Burkes, accompanied by a number of neighbors, went to Bird's house. Bird, it is said, came out of his house with a rifle. His wife took it away from him. Burke, sr., tried to attack Bird, but was prevented by the neighbors.
