I. O. G. T.—The regular quarterly meeting of Kings County Lodge I. O. G. T. was held on the 8th inst. in the Hall of Fair Play Lodge at North Kingston. The chair was occupied by Bro. W. A. A reading on the drink curse by Bro. Blenheim, and several well rendered recitations, a choir of young Brothers and Sisters furnishing a selection of excellent music, a vote of thanks to the members of Fair Play Lodge for the hospitality of the day brought the proceedings to a close.
